## HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION MAY 23, 2016 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2016-0308 5804 WYNONA AVENUE

#### PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1951 house.

#### ARCHITECTURE

One-story, L-plan, side-gabled brick-veneered frame house with a partial-width partiallyinset porch on brick posts; multi-light metal-framed casement windows; integral one-car garage to the right of the house.

#### RESEARCH

The house was built in 1951 by Howard Pringle, a local builder. The first owners and occupants of the house were B. Clary and Dorothy Bates, who lived here until around 1953. B. Clary Bates was originally from Dallas, and was a physician here in Austin with his office on W. 18<sup>th</sup> Street.

Clyde and Estelle Barber purchased the house around 1953, and lived here until around 1989. Clyde Barber was a native of Lexington, Texas, where he farmed. He moved into Austin, and went into the clothes cleaning business, first with Faye Wilder at Longhorn Cleaners. He eventually took over the business at Longhorn Cleaners, and around 1958, he opened a second business, Northwest Cleaners, on Burnet Road.


#### STAFF COMMENTS

The house is beyond the bounds of any City survey.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use; Wynona Avenue is almost completely intact with its collection of 1950s houses, and this house helps represent the character of 1950s suburban development in northwest Austin. However, the house does not have the requisite architectural or historical significance necessary for landmark designation, so staff recommends the completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center.

## **BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES**

## B. Clary and Dorothy Bates (ca. 1951 – ca. 1953)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Clary Bates as the 20-year old son of Charles B. and Kate Bates, who owned their home in Dallas. Clary Bates had been born in Texas and had no occupation listed. His father, Charles B. Bates, was 50, had been born in Texas, and was a deputy collector for the government. Clary was the oldest of the couple's three sons listed. The 1930 U.S. Census shows B. Clary Bates living with his parents in Dallas, where his father was a book-keeper for a lumber company.

## Clyde and Estelle Barber (ca. 1953 – ca. 1989)

Clyde and Estelle Barber appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the renters of the house at 3702 Wabash Avenue in Austin. Clyde Barber was 40, had been born in Texas, and was a dry cleaner. Estelle Barber was 30, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had a son, Monte Clyde Barber, 9, who had been born in Texas. The Barbers had two lodgers: Walter B. Ditto, 23, a Texas-born salesman for a wholesale dry goods company; and James Harold McDaniel, 29, a Texas-born manager of a dry cleaning business.

His 1918 World War I draft registration card shows that Clyde Barber was living at Lexington, Lee County, Texas. He was born in 1899 and was a farmer in Lexington. He was of short height, slender build, and had brown hair and eyes.

Clyde Barber, 87, of Austin, died Tuesday night following a lengthy illness.

Mr. Barber served as a Deacon in Hyde Park Baptist Church for many years.

Funeral services will be held at 10:30 AM, Thursday in the Colonial Chapel of the Cook-Walden Funeral Home, with Dr. Ralph Smith, Pastor of Hyde Park Baptist Church, officiating. Interment will be in Austin Memorial Park.

Mr. Barber was the husband of Estelle Barber of Austin; father and father-in-law of Monty and Kay Barber of Dallas; and brother of Mrs. Willene Peterson of Austin. He is also survived by two grandchildren, two nephews, and one niece.

Pallbearers for the service include: Robert Smith, Louis Steinback, Milton Turner, David Lewis, Harold Johnson, and Mayett Smith. Honorary pallbearers include: Benton Moore, Calvin Guthrie, Members of the Elijah Sunday School Class of Hyde Park Baptist Church, and the Deacon body of Hyde Park Baptist Church.
