PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1948 duplex.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, side-gabled stone-veneered duplex with a shed-roofed entry hood over the entry to each side; single 8:8 fenestration on the front.

RESEARCH


This duplex, like the one next to it at 2115 Brackenridge (recently approved for demolition) was built by Elsie G. Hampton in 1948. The tenants included both students and working people, including a cabinet maker for Calcasieu Lumber Company, a cement finisher, an analyst for the State Department of Agriculture, office workers, and clerks. One tenant, Burmah G. Hunt, rented a unit in the duplex from around 1960 to around 1980. She was a widow and had no occupation listed in the city directories.


STAFF COMMENTS

The duplex does not appear in any City survey.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. The duplex does not have the requisite architectural or historical significance to warrant individual designation as a historic landmark.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Burmah G. Hunt (ca. 1960 – ca. 1980)

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Burmah Hunt living in Lometa, Texas with her son, at her parents' house. Burmah Hunt was a 30-year old Texas-born widow with no occupation listed. She had a son, Lev., Jr., 4, who had been born in Texas. Her parents were Andrew L. and Annie Horne. Andrew Horne was 77 and had been born in Texas; Annie Horne was 63 and had been born in Texas. Neither had an occupation listed.

The 1920 U.S. Census shows Burma Horn living with her sister in a rented apartment in Ranger, Texas, where she worked as a book-keeper in a bank. Burma Horn was 20, and had been born in Texas. She lived with a sister, Loraine Horn, 17, who had been born in Texas and was a clerk in a bank. The 1920 U.S. Census also shows Burmah and Loraine Horne living with their parents, Anderson and Annie Horne, in Lometa, Texas. Burmah Horne was a book-keeper in a bank. Neither of her parents had an occupation listed.

The 1900 U.S. Census shows Lev Hunt living with his sister and her husband in Temple, Texas. Lev Hunt was born in 1872 in Texas and was not married. He was a railroad brakeman. He died of pneumonia in Temple in 1929. His death certificate shows that he was born in Texas and was a railroad conductor.

Her 1980 death certificate shows Burmah Grace Hunt was born in 1899 in Texas. She was living in this duplex at the time of her death. She was a food demonstrator in a grocery store. She was a widow.

This duplex, along with the one at 2115 Brackenridge Street, was built by Warren and Elsie Hampton. Warren Hampton was a shoe repair man; they lived at 517 East Mary Street in the 1930s.


