Why 'Outside the Box' Public Engagement?

- Empower and engage the un-engaged and disempowered
- Foster culture of civility and consensus
- Develop citywide capacity for connecting community to government

Engage the Unengaged

Goals:

- Convenience
- Safety
- Varying levels of input
- Anonymity
- Different amounts of time





Train Community Facilitators to Host Dialogue Sessions on Civic Issues

- Solicit input and advice on variety of current topics
- Enable participants to broach other topics and forge solutions among each other and/or with government
- Facilitators report input to government or agency, which in turn provides feedback to public on how input was utilized
- Keep the community informed and engaged

 Expands reach of engagement beyond those with means and inclination to attend meetings

Discussions and forums mirror facilitated dialogue

 More than 4,000 registered users weigh in on multiple issues, not just a single "cause"

 Solicit comments from the public via text message

- User is sent automated message and questions to answer
- Can send text to existing users
