ORDINANCE NO. <u>010517-29</u>

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING AND REPLACING ARTICLE III OF CHAPTER 15-7 OF THE CITY CODE RELATING TO NAMING CITY FACILITIES; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUSTIN:

PART 1. Article III of Chapter 15-7 of the City Code is repealed and replaced to read as follows:

ARTICLE III. FACILITY NAMING

§ 15-7-18 DEFINITIONS.

In this article:

- (1) **FACILITY** includes a City building, structure, park, pool, playground, or other facility directly used by the public.
- (2) DIRECTOR means:
 - (a) in the case of a duty related to the naming or renaming of a facility other than a park, pool, playground, or park facility, the director of the Public Works Department; or
 - (b) in the case of a duty related to the naming or renaming of a park, pool, playground, or park facility, the director of the Parks and Recreation Department.

§ 15-7-19 POLICY.

- (A) A feature in a facility may be dedicated to a person to recognize a valuable contribution to the community without naming or renaming the facility in which the feature is located. A plaque recognizing a deserving person may be placed in a facility without naming or renaming the facility in which the plaque is placed.
- (B) A facility may be named for an individual, living or dead, or something other than an individual. A facility may be named for an individual only if the individual has provided creditable service to the community and to the City.

- (C) A facility named for an individual may not be renamed.
- (D) Naming or renaming a facility must follow the procedure set forth in this article. The renaming of a facility must be initiated by the City Council or the City Manager.

§ 15-7-20 PROCEDURE FOR NAMING A FACILITY.

- (A) A person may submit a suggestion for naming a facility or endorse a previously submitted suggestion. A suggestion or endorsement must be submitted to the director as provided by this section. The director may promulgate forms for this purpose.
- (B) Not later than the beginning of construction of a new facility, the director shall notify the City Council, the City Manager, the head of the City department that will operate or maintain the facility, the City advisory board that the director finds to have appropriate jurisdiction, and the City's public information officer that a new facility is to be named.
- (C) Immediately on receipt of notice from the director, the City's public information officer shall take reasonable steps to inform persons who are likely to have an interest in the naming of the facility. The public information officer shall consider the nature and location of the facility and whether particular communities are likely to be especially interested in the process, and disseminate the information in a way designed to reach those communities. Information disseminated under this subsection shall include a statement of the deadline for submitting suggestions.
- (D) A suggestion or endorsement must be received by the director no later than the 90th day after date of the director's notice under Subsection (B).
- (E) A suggestion for naming a facility must include:
 - (1) if the suggestion is an individual's name, a biographical sketch of the individual whose name is suggested, a description of the individual's involvement in the community, and the individual's connection, if any, to the facility or to the activity for which the facility will be used; or
 - (2) if the suggestion is not an individual's name, justification for the suggested name.
- (F) As soon as practicable after the deadline for receiving suggestions and endorsements, the director shall submit completed suggestions and endorsements to the chair of the City advisory board that the director finds to have appropriate jurisdiction.

- (G) On receipt of the suggestions and endorsements, the City advisory board shall schedule and conduct a public hearing on naming the facility. The advisory board shall make a written recommendation to the City Council no later than the 45th day after the date the chair receives the suggestions and endorsements, and shall provide a copy of the recommendation to the City Manager. If the advisory board fails to meet the deadline prescribed in this section, the board is considered to have no recommendation.
- (H) The City Manager shall provide to each councilmember a copy of the advisory board's recommendation and the suggestions and endorsements received by the director. The City Manager shall place an item regarding the naming of the facility on the Council's agenda as soon as practicable after the advisory board makes its recommendation, or after the period prescribed by Subsection (G) expires, whichever is earlier.
- (I) The City Council may by resolution establish different criteria and procedures for the naming of a particular facility. If a facility is partially funded by another entity, the Council shall consider that entity's concerns in naming the facility.

§ 15-7-21 PROCEDURE FOR RENAMING A FACILITY.

- (A) A person may submit a suggestion for renaming a facility or endorse a previously submitted suggestion. A suggestion or endorsement must be submitted to the director as provided by this section. The director may promulgate forms for this purpose.
- (B) On initiation of the renaming of a City facility under Section. 15-7-19(D), the director shall notify the persons listed in Section 15-7-20(B), and the public information officer shall disseminate the information as provided in Section 15-7-20(C). A notice under this section shall state that the facility is being renamed.
- (C) A suggestion for renaming a facility must include:
 - (1) if the suggestion is an individual's name, a biographical sketch of the individual whose name is suggested, a description of the individual's involvement in the community, and the individual's connection, if any, to the facility or to the activity for which the facility will be used;
 - (2) if the suggestion is not an individual's name, justification for the suggested name; and
 - (3) an estimate of cost to the City for replacement of signs and plaques.

- (D) A suggestion or endorsement must be received by the director no later than the 90th day after the date of the director's notice under Subsection (B).
- (E) As soon as practicable after the deadline for receiving suggestions and endorsements, the director shall submit completed suggestions and endorsements to the chair of the City advisory board that the director finds to have appropriate jurisdiction.
- (F) On receipt of the suggestions and endorsements the City advisory board shall hold a public hearing and provide its recommendation in the same manner and within the same time prescribed in Section 15-7-20(G). The City Manager shall provide information to the Council, and place an item on the Council's agenda regarding the renaming of the facility in the same manner as prescribed Section 15-7-20(H).
- (G) The City Council may by resolution establish different criteria and procedures for the renaming of a particular facility. If a facility is partially funded by another entity, the Council shall consider that entity's concerns in renaming the facility.

PART 2. The Council waives the requirements of Sections 2-2-3 and 2-2-7 of the City Code for this ordinance.

PART 3. The Council finds that the need for consistent policies and procedures for naming City facilities constitutes an emergency. Because of this emergency, this ordinance takes effect immediately on its passage for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.

I have the following information regarding the status of the Dickinson House.

On August 6, 2002 I met with the Land and Facilities Committee of the Parks Board to explain that the Parks and Recreation Department will explore additional locations for placement of the Dickinson House. The potential downtown locations are on Brush Square and Palm Park. I reported that each alternative would be evaluated according to compatibility with the existing park design, impact on other park features such as buildings, trees and floodplain, the expected mitigation for adverse impacts, and other relevant factors.

The proposed locations are the northeast corner of Brush Square, the southwest corner of Brush Square and the north side of Palm Park. I anticipate the evaluation will be complete in early September.

A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE ART IN PUBLIC PLACES PANEL
AND THE AUSTIN ARTS COMMISSION
REQUESTING AUSTIN CITY COUNCIL
TO REVISE THE CITY CODE GOVERNING THE
ART IN PUBLIC PLACES PROGRAM

TO REMOVE THE \$200,000 CAP ON ART IN PUBLIC PLACES ALLOCATIONS
FOR CITY CONSTRUCTION (CIP) PROJECTS, AND
TO INCREASE ART IN PUBLIC PLACES ALLOCATIONS FOR
CITY CONSTRUCTION (CIP) PROJECTS TO 2%;
TO REQUIRE INFRASTRUCTURE (CIP) PROJECTS TO PARTICIPATE IN
THE ART IN PUBLIC PLACES PROGRAM;
TO REVISE THE REFERENCES TO THE CITY STAFF POSITION
RESPONSIBLE FOR MANAGING THE ART IN PUBLIC PLACES PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the Art in Public Places program was established by City Ordinance in 1985 (No. 850926-0; amended by No. 861009-A; amended by No. 970904-B; Austin City Code Volume 1, Title IX, Chapter 9-2) mandating that One Percent (1%) of city construction budgets for eligible city construction projects be set aside and used to commission public art not to exceed \$200,000 for a single city construction project; and,

WHEREAS, since its establishment, the Art in Public Places program has successfully commissioned and/or purchased over 100 works of fine art worth over \$2 million for city parks and buildings throughout Austin that enhance the urban environment and enrich the lives of citizens and tourists visiting Austin for business or pleasure; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Austin Art in Public Places program is nationally recognized for its excellence and is looked to as an example by cities desiring to establish public art programs; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Austin is initiating and supporting numerous cultural endeavors, including, the George Washington Carver Museum & Cultural Center expansion, as well as the construction of the new Mexican-American Cultural Center and the Long Center for the Performing Arts, that will further strengthen the Arts in Austin and now is an excellent time to expand the capabilities of the Art in Public Places Program; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Austin is enjoying unprecedented growth that is propelling it into the ranks of a world class city and yet Austin is the *only* city in the United States with a public art program that has a cap on the percentage of construction budgets allocated for public art; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Austin Design Commission's *Downtown Austin Design Guidelines* recommends lifting the \$200,000 cap on single construction projects; and,

WHEREAS, with the current 1% allocation, the average Art in Public Places project budget is approximately \$20,000; and,

WHEREAS, since the Art in Public Places Ordinance was passed in 1985, the cost of construction and inflation is continually diminishing the scale of artwork that may be commissioned and that such scale is vital to the impact a public artwork may have in relation to its architectural context; and,

WHEREAS, public artworks are small construction projects within large ones with the same requirements, including professional design work, engineer sealed drawings, liability insurance, durable materials that are easily maintained, equipment and tools, professional construction skills, etc., and, thus, public art budgets must be adequate to cover these costs; and,

WHEREAS, cities such as Portland, San Jose, Miami, Fort Lauderdale, Houston, Dallas and Corpus Christi allocate 1 ½% - 2% of city construction budgets for public art; and,

WHEREAS, a larger percentage would insure adequate funds for public education programs, technical outreach programs for artists, maintenance of the AIPP collection and administrative costs; and,

WHEREAS, there are currently many lost opportunities for enhancing the city's infrastructure, such CIP projects as roadways, sidewalks, bridges, underpasses, and tunnels and the City of Austin Design Commission's *Downtown Austin Design Guidelines* recommends including art public infrastructure projects; and,

WHEREAS, the *Great Streets Master Plan* also advocates the inclusion of art in public infrastructure projects; and,

WHEREAS, the job title for the city staff position responsible for managing the Art in Public Places program is now called, "Art in Public Places Administrator";

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED

That the Art in Public Places Panel and the Austin Arts Commission request City Council to revise the Art in Public Places Ordinance to:

- a.) Remove the cap of \$200,000 on Art in Public Places allocations for single construction projects;
- b.) Increase the allocation for Art in Public Places from One Percent (1%) to Two Percent (2%); and,
- c.) Require CIP infrastructure projects to participate in the Art in Public Places Program; and,
- d.) Revise all references to "Art in Public Places Coordinator" to reflect the new position title, "Art in Public Places Administrator".

Layoffs to hit bosses hardest

Almost half of 220 city employees receiving notices are managers

Executives and supervisors make up nearly half of the 220 Dallas city employees who received layoff notices this week. Fewer than one-quarter are laborers.

Among the planned layoffs are eight executives, 97 managers, 79 clerical workers, 13 semiskilled and unskilled laborers, and 23 skilled technicians. If the City Council ratifies the city manager's \$1.7 billion budget for fiscal year

2003, the employees will lose their jobs Sept. 30.

Some top officials, such as Mayor Laura Miller, called the layoffs necessary and evenhanded.

"It was abundantly fair," Ms. Miller said Friday.

But some employees who lost their jobs said that seniority wasn't weighed properly and that layoffs are necessary only because police officers and firefighters will receive 5 percent raises.

Heaviest hit by the layoffs is the Park Department, one of the city's largest. It issued layoff notices to 71 full- and part-time workers. Code compliance stands to lose 13 employees, and public works could lose 12.

Ms. Miller said some jobs could be saved in the Park Department if she can persuade the council to cut other expenses that total between \$3.5 million and \$6 million.

"I'm confident," she said. "I have several different options for

restoring the service cuts."

The council must decide over the next month what changes it will make to City Manager Ted Benavides' budget, which includes a tax increase of 3.49 cents per \$100 of assessed property valuation. The council will vote on a final budget Sept. 25.

Facing a \$95 million budget shortfall, the city manager cut costs largely by eliminating jobs from the city's roughly 8,000-person workforce. He also suspended vehicle purchases and postponed major building maintenance.

Some city employees have argued that civilians are losing jobs because police officers and fire-fighters stand to get pay raises. The raises will cost the city \$17 million while the layoffs will save \$11 million.

"You are choosing one group to suffer more than others," said Joanna Mathieson, a management assistant in the Trinity River Project office who was told that she would lose her job.

Ms. Mathieson, a five-year employee, said management should have offered buyouts to employees close to retirement so newer employees could remain.

Victoria Eiker, a 22-year employee, said she was disappointed that her seniority did not save her position. "I've spent half my life here, and it literally comes down to this," said Ms. Eiker, who works in the public information office and produces the city newsletter.

Ms. Eiker, 44, was a spokeswoman in the Police Department until two years ago, when she lost her job in another reduction in force. She found a job at City Hall, but she is not as optimistic that she will get a third life with the city.

Mr. Benavides has eliminated many of the city's vacant positions. He has promised to find work for as many former employees as possible, but many jobs are frozen.

James Fantroy, a council member who has been a torchbearer for civilian employees, lamented the reduction in force but said it is probably inevitable.

"I looked at each one last night, and it's about as fair as you can get," Mr. Fantroy said Friday.
