## HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION SEPTEMBER 26, 2016 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2016-0566 2021 FORD STREET

## PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1950 house.

#### ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, side-gabled frame house with an eave overhang across the front forming a full-width entry cover; combination of metal-framed multi-light casement windows and modern replacement windows.

#### RESEARCH

The house was built in the winter of 1950-51 by the Cole Construction Company of Austin. The first owners and occupants were Paul and Elizabeth Garnett, who lived here until around 1954. Paul Garnett was a salesman for Swift and Company, a meat packing company on Congress Avenue. The Garnetts added the garage and breezeway addition to the house in 1951.

Throughout the remainder of the 1950s, the house was a rental property; the tenants in the mid-1950s were William and Frances McGinty; both worked at banks. Around 1958, the house was rented by Rogers and Connie E. Barton, who lived here until around 1966. Rogers L. Barton was a native of Temple, Texas, and worked as a consultant to the State Education Agency while he and Connie lived in this house. Connie Barton was the director of nursing at Austin State Hospital. Rogers Barton's last employment listing in the Austin city directories was as an employee of the Corpus Christi public schools. He and Connie divorced in 1970, and Rogers Barton died in Temple, Texas in 1984. There was no obituary in the Austin newspapers.

A bank teller owned this house in the late 1960s; it was then a rental property again through the 1970s and early 1980s. A law firm employee is listed as the owner of the house in the mid-1980s, but it was again a rental property in the early 1990s.


#### STAFF COMMENTS

The house is beyond the bounds of any City survey to date.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, then relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. While staff recognizes that Ford Street has significance for its neighborhood character and activities, we are limited at this point to determining whether this, as any other, house has the qualities to be designated as a historic landmark, and staff does not believe that this house meets those qualifications.

## **BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES**

# Rogers L. and Connie Barton (ca. 1956 – ca. 1966)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Rogers Barton as the 20-year old son of Rogers and Ruth Barton, who owned their home in Temple, Texas. Rogers Barton had been born in Texas and had no occupation listed. His father, 45, was a Texas-born time keeper on a WPA project. Rogers had a younger sister, Sarah, 13.

Rogers and Connie Barton were married in 1942 and divorced in Travis County in 1970. He died in Bell County, Texas in 1984.
