PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1940 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, front-gabled frame house with a partial-width inset porch on ornamental metal posts; combination of fenestration patterns with single 1:1 and 4:1 windows.

RESEARCH


The house was built in 1940 by James K. Kimble, according to a city water service permit for this address. James K. Kimble rented the house out to Sam and Madie Fowler from 1940 to around 1942; Sam Fowler does not appear in the city directories, but the 1940 U.S. Census showing him and Madie at this address shows him as a farmer. Madie Fowler had no occupation shown in the city directories, nor in the census report. The house was then rented by Edward Washington, Jr. and his wife, Carrie, from around 1942 until around 1950. Edward Washington worked at the San Jacinto Laundry and Dry Cleaning Company in the late 1940s, but had no occupation listed in the 1949 city directory. A driver for a concrete company and his wife rented the house in the early 1950s, then the house was owned and occupied by James and Willie M. Kimble from around 1953 until the early 1970s. James K. Kimble was a janitor for Travis County, and lived here until his death in 1971. The house has been a rental property since that time.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house is not listed in any city survey to date.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

This house appears to be in poor condition, so staff recommends release of the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. The house has neither the architectural nor the historical significance to warrant individual designation as a historic landmark.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Madie Fowler (ca. 1940 – ca. 1942)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Sam and Madie M. Fowler as the renters of this house. Sam Fowler was 56, had been born in Texas, and was a farmer. Madie M. Fowler was 50, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had 5 children: Marie, 25, a maid in a private home; James, 23, who did construction work at Marshall Ford Dam; Yancey, 20, who did

construction work at Marshall Ford Dam; Lee W., 14; and Waverly L., 12. All the children had been born in Texas. The family had lived in rural Travis County in 1935.

Her 1973 death certificate shows that Madie Fowler was born in 1886 in Texas, and was living at 1709 Clifford Avenue at the time of her death. She did housework. She was buried in Evergreen Cemetery.

Edward, Jr. and Carrie Washington (ca. 1942 – ca. 1950)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Carrie E. Johnson as the daughter of Brister and Mary Worlds, who lived across the street from this house at 1702 E. 19th Street. Carrie was 27, had been born in Texas, and was a cook and a housekeeper in a private home.

Carrie Lee Washington's 1964 death certificate shows that she was living on an Austin rural route at the time of her death. She was born in 1912 in Lee County, Texas to Brister and Mary Worlds, and was a housewife. The informant on her death certificate was Eddie Washington.

Eddie Washington's 1979 death certificate shows that he was born in 1916 in Bastrop County, Texas, and was living at 5402 Samuel Huston Drive at the time of his death. He worked as a demolition contractor. He married Bernice Harrison in 1970; she is listed as the informant on his death certificate.

James K. and Willie M. Kimble (ca. 1953 – ca. 1973)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Jim K. and Willie Kimble living in a rented house on Maha Road in Travis County. Jim K. Kimble was 51, had been born in Texas, and was a farmer. Willie Kimble was 42, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had no children listed with them.

His 1971 death certificate shows that James Lee Kimble was living at this address at the time of his death. He was born in 1888 in San Marcos, Texas, and was a retired custodian for Travis County.

JAMES L. KIMBLE

James L. Kimble, 82, of 1703 East 19th St died Monday.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 3:30 p.m. at Corinth Baptist Church with Rev. L.R. Wilson officiating. Burial will be in Evergreen Cemetery under direction of King-Tears Mortuary, Inc. The body will lie in state at the church from 12 noon until funeral time.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Willie Kimble; two daughters, Mrs. Annie Brooks and Mrs. Carrie E. Mathis, all of Austin; one brother, Will J. Kimble of San Antonio; two grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.
