# HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION SEPTEMBER 26, 2016 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2016-0604 1225 HILLSIDE AVENUE

#### **PROPOSAL**

Demolish four houses on the same lot, the earliest of which is ca. 1949.

#### ARCHITECTURE

There are four houses on this property, which is a hidden lot uphill from the street. What appears to be the principal house is a one-story, rectangular-plan, flat-roofed frame house with a combination of siding, including cedar shingles. This house also has a combination of fenestration, with the most visible windows being metal-framed multi-light casement windows. The next house in behind it is a two-story structure, which looks more like a garage apartment that has been added on to. It is a hipped-roof frame structure with fixed-sash and sliding wood-framed fenestration. The third house back is a one-story, rectangular-plan, side-gabled frame house with a central, partial-width, front-gabled entry porch on turned wood posts; 2:2 horizontally-configured fenestration. Finally, the house closest to the street is a one-story, side-gabled pre-fabricated house with 1:1 fenestration.

#### RESEARCH


The earliest house on this site, which is ca. 1949, was built by Percy and Margaret Maynord, who lived here until around 1970. Percy Maynord was a salesman who then opened his own butcher and meat market supply business from the house; he also had a grocery store and specialty meat market on S. Congress Avenue in the late 1960s. There is no information in the city directories about the tenants of the other houses on this lot, nor are there any building permits for their construction. After the Maynords moved back to Alabama in the 1970s, all of the houses became rental properties.

#### STAFF COMMENTS

The houses are not listed in any City survey.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, then relocation over demolition, but release the permits. The houses have neither the architectural nor the historical significance to warrant designation as a historic landmark.

**MAYNORD, Percy Carwell** 

Percy Carwell Maynord, age 94, of Fairhope, Alabama, died peacefully at his home on Sunday, May 18, 2014. A funeral service, conducted by Dr. Jerry Henry of the First Baptist Church of Fairhope, was held at the Wolfe-Bayview Funeral Home on Wednesday, May 21. Honorary pallbearers were Wesley and Aubrey Grant; and members of his breakfast and coffee groups, including Don Buell, Dr. Jack Campbell, Don Duke, Joe Faust, Thomas Garrick, Dan Heffern, John McDonald, Jerry Middleton, Harold Thompson, Garth White, Bob Whitley, and host David Jewett. Interment followed the next day at Elmwood Cemetery in Birmingham with military honors.

Percy was born in Birmingham on January 21, 1920 and was a graduate of Ensley High School. He followed his father, Wiley Maynord, into employment at U. S. Steel's Fairfield Works after high school. After convincing his employer to release him from his exemption from military service, he volunteered for the Army Air Corp. Wanting to be a fighter pilot, he entered the service in 1942 and served at air bases in Texas, training air crew navigators. On D-Day, June 6, 1944, while his brother was invading Normandy, he married his sweetheart, Margaret Dean Harris. Upon his discharge from the service in September 1945, they remained in Austin, Texas, where he founded P. C. Maynord Company, a supplier and servicer of meat processing equipment. Over the next 40 years, his customers included meat markets all over central Texas, as well the startups that became Mr. Gatti's Pizza, Schlotzsky's, and Whole Foods Market. During the late '60's and early 70's, he also owned and operated a grocery store with a specialty meat market on South Congress Avenue.

During his 60 years as a resident of Austin, Texas, Percy and Dean raised three sons. He was a Life Membership deacon of Congress Avenue Baptist Church, where he enjoyed playing on and coaching church softball teams. Percy was recognized for his multi-decade support of the Texas Baptist Buckner's Boys Ranch. He was an avid hunter, and in 1963 he realized one of his dreams, by buying 220 acres of farm and ranch land northwest of Austin.

Following his retirement in 1985, Percy and Dean enjoyed visiting their children and their families and travelling with close friends Bob and Lolly Campbell. During these travels they visited 49 of the 50 States, and most of the Canadian Provinces. After multiple 700-mile trips per year to coastal Alabama to look after Margaret's sister who was in assisted living-the 85 year-olds were looking after the 100 year-old!-they moved to Fairhope in 2005. The seller of the house they bought, Bob Whitley, became his new best friend. He also found fast and true friends in his morning breakfast group at Julwin's Restaurant and afternoon coffee group at Waffle House. They joined others who love Christ at First Baptist Church. It was a great move for them at that stage of their life! Percy was preceded in death by his parents, Wiley and Catherine Maynord; and brothers William, Elbert and Richard. He is survived by his wife of 70 years, Margaret; sons Chris (Connie) of Goodlettsville, TN, Steve (Beverly) of St. Joseph, LA, and Harris (Denise) of Fairhope, AL; grandchildren Natalie Taylor, Dominic Barnes, Alicia Samuels, Matthew Barnes, Dudley Maynord, Maggie Nasif, Katie Maynord, and Clare Satow; and great-grandchildren Evan Cude, Annalyn Samuels, Andrew Nasif, Lucy Nasif, Alex Maynord, Brandon Maynord, and Madison Maynord.
