PROPOSAL

Construct a second-story addition to the one-story house.

PROJECT SPECIFICATIONS

The applicant proposes the construction of a full second-story addition to the house that will be flush with the existing house front. The wing-and-gable configuration of the house will be retained, but the house will be two stories, clad in brick veneer, and will have a contemporary awning over the principal entry. The house will feature large casement-style windows in the projecting gable on both stories, and floor-to-ceiling windows on the ground floor.

RESEARCH

The one-story wing-and-gable plan house was built in 1940; the first owner and occupant was sporting goods salesman Walter Allen, and his wife Mary Jane. They lived here until around 1943. From the mid-1940s through the early 1950s, the house was owned and occupied by John S. and Hallie Burns; he was a vice-president of Capital National Bank in the Norwood Building.

Around 1951, the house was purchased by Rosalie Godfrey, a professor of home economics at the University of Texas. Professor Godfrey had previously been the business director of the women's dormitories at the University, and joined the faculty of the Department of Home Economics in 1928. She did considerable research in the area of large quantity food production, and supervised a study on the cooking of meats in the late 1950s. She lived here until her death in 1966.

The house was a rental unit in the late 1960s and early 1970s until it was purchased by Rodney and Carol Green, who lived here through the 1990s. Rodney Green was a salesman for the William Gammon Insurance Agency.

STANDARDS FOR REVIEW

The Old West Austin National Register Historic District has no design guidelines for additions to houses. General design principles for contributing houses in historic district discourage transforming one-story houses into two-story houses, and further discourage any changes to the front of contributing structures.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff must recommend release of the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center, and with the following provisions:

- 1. Reduce the size and scale of the proposed addition, and set it at least 15 feet back from the front of the house.
- 2. Retain the original façade of the house to the highest degree possible.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Walter L. and Mary J. Allen (ca. 1941 – ca. 1943)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Walter and Mary Jane Allen as the renters of the house at 2831 San Gabriel Street in Austin. Walter Allen was 29, had been born in Texas, and was a

salesman in a retail sporting goods store. He had lived in Luling, Texas in 1935. Mary Jane Allen was 25, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. She had lived in San Antonio, Texas in 1935. They had a son, Walter, 1, who had been born in Texas.

His 1961 death certificate shows that Walter Lewis Allen was living in Victoria, Texas at the time of his death. He was a service station operator, who had been born in 1909 in Prairie Lea, Caldwell County, Texas. He was buried in the Luling Cemetery in Luling, Texas.

Rosalie S. Godfrey (ca. 1951 – ca. 1966)

Rosalie Godfrey is listed in the 1940 U.S. Census as the business director of the Littlefield Dormitory on the University of Texas campus. She was 45, had been born in South Dakota, and was single. She lived in the dormitory.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Rosalie S. Godfrey as a lodger in the home of Martha C. Lockett at 300 W. 26th Street in Austin. Martha Lockett was the directory of the girls' dormitory at the University of Texas; Rosalie Godfrey was the 35-year old South Dakota-born business director of the girls' dormitory.

Her 1966 death certificate shows that Rosalie Seneca Godfrey was living at this house at the time of her death. She had been born in Hot Springs, South Dakota in 1895, and was an associate professor emeritus at the University of Texas.

UT Prof Godfrey Succumbs

Miss Rosalie 3. Godfrey, associate professor emeritus of home economics at The Univeristy of Texas, died Monday night in Brackenridge Hospital following a long illness.

Miss Godfrey, who lived at 1613 Mohle Drive, had been associated with UT since 1927.

For a number of years she was business director of residence halls at UT. She served on building committees for many of the dormitories, women's gymnasium and other buildings. She retired from the faculty in June, 1965.

Born in Hot Springs, D. S., Miss Godfrey was reared in Holton, Kan. She received a bachelor of science degree from Kansas State College and a master of arts from the Univer-¹|sity of Washington.

Miss Godirey was a member of a number of national comrimittees and boards as well as the American and Texas Dietetic Associations, American Association of University Professors and State Nutrition Council, She belonged to the University Methodist Church.

She is survived by a cousin, Mrs. Roy Melendy of Sterling, Colo.

Obituary of Rosalie Godfrey Austin Statesman, March 1, 1966

IN MEMORIAM

ROSALIE S. GODFREY

Rosalie S. Godfrey, Associate Professor Emeritus of Home Economics at The University of Texas died in Brackenridge Hospital in Austin on February 28, 1966, after a long illness. She is survived by a cousin, Mrs. Roy Melendy of Sterling, Colorado.

Miss Godfrey was born on February 22, 1895, in Hot Springs, South Dakota. She was reared in Holton, Kansas, and earned her Bachelor of Science degree in home economics from Kansas State College. Following graduation she taught for two years in Hutchinson High School and then taught for several years at the University of Missouri as an assistant professor of institutional administration. From 1920 to 1922 she worked as a research assistant for the United States Department of Agriculture. Her third year in Washington was spent as Director of Food Services for the Grace Dodge Hotel. While in Washington she took advantage of her proximity to George Washington University and enrolled in night courses in journalism. Never for the rest of her life was she to lose her interest and enthusiasm for journalistic writing.

Following a year of graduate study at the University of Washington during which she earned a Master of Arts degree with a major in institutional administration and a minor in business administration, Miss Godfrey returned to the University of Missouri to fell a research position. She came to The University of Texas in the fall semester of 1927 where she remained until her death.

For many years she was the business director of all residence halls on The University campus and served on the building and furnishing committees for Andrews and Carothers dormitories; Roberts, Prather, and Brackenridge Halls; the Women's Gymnasium; and the Home Economics Building. She was appointed to the faculty of the Department of Home Economics in 1928 and taught both undergraduate and graduate courses in institutional administration. Her research interest was, in the area of large quantity food production. From 1955 to 1958 she

directed a research study on meat cookery supported by, the Quartermaster Food and Container Institute.

Miss Godfrey was active as elected officer and committee member in a number of professional associations including the American Dietetic Association, The Texas Dietetic Association, The American Association of University Professors, the Texas State Nutrition Council, and the Texas Restaurant Association. She was a member of the University Methodist Church.

In both teaching and research and in the development of the dormitory System on this campus she made significant contributions. Rosalie Godfrey 'was a good and loyal friend and colleague; her dedicated service and personal courage will remain an inspiration to everyone who knew her.
