PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1946 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, side-gabled frame house with a projecting front-gabled bay in the center of the façade, containing the entry under a partial-width inset porch on an ornamental metal support; single 1:1 fenestration.

RESEARCH

The house was built in 1946 by Coy Dobbins, the son of George and Emma Dobbins, who lived here until around 1948. Coy Dobbins was the proprietor of a lumber business in Austin. While living here, his father, George Dobbins, was a foreman for the lumber company. The house was a rental property from the late 1940s until the mid-1950s, when it was purchased by Julius and Florence Schmitz, who lived here through the 1990s. Julius Schmitz was a shoe salesman, who later became the manager of Vosburg-Martin Shoes on Congress Avenue. After Vosburg-Martin closed, Julius Schmitz went to work as a salesman for Kara-Vel Shoes on Burnet Road.


STAFF COMMENTS

The house is not listed in any City survey to date.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, then relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. The house, while representative of the post-World War II architecture of this neighborhood, lacks the required historical and architectural significance for individual designation as a historic landmark.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

George and Emma Dobbins (ca. 1946 – ca. 1948)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows George and Emma Dobbins as the renters of the house at 1611 Sabine Street in Austin. George Dobbins was 54, had been born in Texas, and was a truck driver for a lumber company. Emma Dobbins was 55, had been born in Tennessee, and had no occupation listed. They had 2 children: Thurman, 27, the proprietor of a candy and cigarette stand; and Vida, 25, the cashier in a lunch room. Both Thurman and Vida had been born in Texas.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows George M. and Emma L. Dobbins as the renters of the house at 1005 Clermont Street in Austin. George M. Dobbins was 45, had been born in Texas, and was a laborer for private firms. Emma L. Dobbins was 45, had been born in Tennessee, and had no occupation listed. They had 4 children: Coy L, 22, who had no occupation listed; Oletta, 20, a saleslady in a dry goods store; Thurman, 17; and Vida, 15. All of the children had been born in Texas.

His 1966 death certificate shows that George Miller Dobbins was born in Windom, Texas in 1884, and was living at 1717 Valeria Street in Austin at the time of his death. He was in the lumber business.

Julius and Florence Schmitz (ca. 1957 -)

Julius Schmitz appears in the 1940 U.S. Census as the 17-year old son of Julius and Agnes Schmitz, who rented their home at 907 W. 9th Street in Austin. Julius Schmitz had been born in Texas and worked in a drug store as a fountain dispenser. His father, Julius Schmitz, was 45, had been born in Texas, and was a brick mason. His mother, Agnes Schmitz, 36, had been born in Texas and was a janitress in the public schools. Julius was the oldest of the couple's 4 sons: Alfred, 15; Billy, 11; and Bobby, 9. All the boys had been born in Texas.

Julius L. Schmitz, Sr.

Julius L. Schmitz, Sr., age 68, a lifetime resident of Austin, died Monday, January 14, 1991.

Mr. Schmitz was a veteran of World War II and was assistant Sargeant at Arms, Texas House of Representatives. He worked for 30 years as manager for Vosburg-Martin Shoes.
