PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1954 house designed and built by A.D. Stenger.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, L-plan stone-veneered frame house with a flared stone wall as the street-facing feature of the projecting gable; the carport was added to the house in 1962. The house exhibits several tenets of mid-century Modern design, including the extensive use of native materials in the stonework on the house, a long, low composition, and the flared stone wall on the street-facing projecting bay is typical of the non-traditional angles and lines which distinguish mid-century Modern architecture. Even the carport, built in 1962, reflects mid-century Modern design principles in its angled support poles.

RESEARCH

The house was designed and built by local architect A.D. Stenger in 1954; Stenger was a master of the mid-century Modern style in Austin. The first owners and occupants were Frederick J. Knorre, Jr. and his wife, Evelyn, who lived here until around 1960. Frederick J. Knorre, Jr. was in the U.S. Air Force. He and Evelyn moved to Great Falls, Montana after leaving this house. The house was rented by Miguel and Gloria Enguidanos in the early 1960s; Miguel Enguidanos was a professor of Spanish at the University of Texas.

From the mid-1960s until very recently, the house was owned and occupied by James R. "Jim" Rudolph and his wife, Marjorie. Jim Rudolph was a professional athlete in his younger days, and had been the starting pitcher for the Milwaukee Braves in the 1940s. While living in this house, he was a credit investigator for the Retail Credit Bureau on Guadalupe Street, and later for Unifac, a national credit reporting agency. Marjorie Rudolph died in 2002; Jim Rudolph died in February, 2016.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house is not listed in any City survey to date.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Postpone to December 19, 2016 to fully explore alternatives to demolition. A.D. Stenger houses are extremely important to the architectural history of Austin, and there are a fixed number of them remaining in the city limits. This house appears to be intact in its original design, and in good condition, and every effort should be made to preserve this Stenger house rather than demolish it. If the Commission does not vote to postpone the case, then staff recommends initiation of a historic zoning case. Staff cannot recommend release of the permit, but if the Commission votes to do so, then staff recommends completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center.
