PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1948 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, wing-and-gable plan frame house with a partial-width, shed-roofed independent porch; French doors in the projecting gable bay; single and paired 1:1 fenestration elsewhere.

RESEARCH

The house was built around 1948; the first owners and occupants were Frank and Mildred Monk, who lived here until around 1951. Frank Monk was a city policeman. Raymond and Jennie Morter bought the house in the early 1950s. They were from Dawson, Texas, near Corsicana, where he was an engineer for the local cotton gin, and they ran a boarding house, renting rooms to mostly professional people, including several school teachers. They bought this house upon their arrival in Austin, where they retired. Raymond Morter died in 1960s; Jennie Morter lived here until around 1975. The house is listed as vacant in the late 1970s and mid-1980s.


STAFF COMMENTS

STAFF RECOMMENDATION



BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

Frank and Mildred Monk (ca. 1948 – ca. 1951)

Frank Monk appears in the 1930 U.S. Census as the 17-year old son of Robert and Mattie Monk, who rented their home at 607 Theresa Avenue in Austin. Frank had been born in Texas and had no occupation listed. His father, Robert Monk, 59, was an Alabama-born pa9int and wallpaper contractor. His mother, Mattie Monk, 51, had been born in Mississippi and had no occupation listed. Frank had an older brother, Drenon Monk, 19, who had been born in Texas and was a delivery man for an ice cream company.

Frank Monk's 1980 death certificate shows that he was born in 1912 in Texas, and was a retired policeman for the Austin Police Department. He lived at 6403 Nasco Drive at the time of his death.

Raymond and Jennie Morter (ca. 1951 – ca. 1975)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Raymond P. and Jennie L. Morter as the operators of a rooming house in Dawson, Navarro County, Texas. Raymond P. Morter was 65, had been born in Missouri, and was a steam engineer for the steam cotton oil mill. Jennie L. Morter was 59, had been born in Texas, and was the proprietor of a boarding house. They ran a rooming house for 6 lodgers, including the superintendent of a WPA project, and 3 public school teachers.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Ray and Jennie Morter running a boarding house in Dawson, Texas. Ray Morter was a stationary engineer for the cotton gin. They had a daughter, Leora, 23, who had been born in Texas and had no occupation listed. The family had 10 boarders, including a pharmacist, a blacksmith, a barber, a dental surgeon, a phone company lineman, and several public school teachers.

His 1960 death certificate shows that Raymond Peter Morter was born in 1875 in Missouri, and was living in this house at the time of his death. He was an engineer.

RAYMOND P. MORTER

Raymond P. Moer, 85, of 4303 Bellvue, died in a local hospital Friday. He had been a resident of Austin seven years and was a former resident of Dawson. He was a retired engineer and member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors are his widow, Mrs. Jennie L. Morter of Austin; a daughter, Mrs. George H. Shafer of Austin; three sisters, Mrs. H. E. Sherwood of Childress, Mrs. John E. Luttrell and Mrs. Estell Chestney, both of Norman, Okla.; three brother, R. L. Morter of Lomita, Calif. Arthur Morter of Plainview and Dr. R. A. Morter of Kalamozaa. Mich.; three grand-children and many nieces and nephews.

The body will be at Weed-Corley Funeral Home until Saturday afternoon when it will be taken to Dawson for funeral srevices Sunday at 2 p.m. at Dawson Methodist Church. Burial will be in Dawson Cemetery.


