PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1936 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, side-gabled, wood-sided frame house in the minimal traditional style; symmetrical façade with a pair of 1:1 wood windows flanking the central entry under a front-gabled entry hood; 6:1 wood screens; exterior, battered chimney.

RESEARCH

City utility permit records show a water service permit for this address in July, 1936, and the address first appears in the 1937 Austin city directory. The first owners and occupants were A. Don and May Beasley, who lived here until around 1938. A. Don Beasley was an interviewer for the National Re-Employment Service; he and May were living in Fort Worth by 1940, where he was an interviewer for a state department.

The house was vacant in the late 1930s, then rented and later owned by W. Carl and Maggie Jackson, who lived here until around 1955. W. Carl Jackson was a barber, who was the co-owner of the Avenue Barber Shop near 9th and Congress at the time that he and Maggie moved into this house. He later owned and operated the Allandale Barber Shop on Burnet Road.

From the mid-1950s through at least the early 1990s, the house was owned and occupied by Henry D. and Alene Wilkinson. The Wilkinsons had lived near Brownsville, Texas in 1940, when Henry worked as a U.S. Customs Officer. After moving to Austin, he worked as a carpenter and contractor, but for most of the time that he and Alene spent in this house, he was retired. Alene Wilkinson lived to be over 100 years old.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house is beyond the scope of any City survey to date.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, then relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

A. Don and May Beasley (ca. 1936 – ca. 1938)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Don and May Beasley as the renters of a house in Fort Worth, Texas. Don Beasley was 41, had been born in Texas, and was an interviewer for a state department. May Beasley was 40, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had two daughters: Flo Beth, 15; and Mary Sue, 12. Both girls had been born in Texas and neither had an occupation listed. The family had lived in Austin in 1935.

His 1966 death certificate shows that Don A. Beasley was living in Fort Worth at the time of his death at the VA Hospital in Dallas. He was born on Christmas Day, 1897 in Texas, and was a carpenter. He had served in World War I.

Her 1973 death certificate shows that May Belle Beasley was a widow who had been born in 1900 in San Marcos, Texas. She had been living in Arlington, Texas for the 6 years prior to her death. She was a housewife.

W. Carl and Maggie Jackson (ca. 1940 – ca. 1955)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows W. Carl and Maggie V. Jackson as the renters of the house at 1409 Newton Street in Austin. W. Carl Jackson was 43, had been born in Texas, and was a barber with his own shop. Maggie V. Jackson was 45, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had no children listed with them.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Carl W. and Maggie Jackson living in a rented house in Lampasas, Texas. Carl W. Jackson was a 34-year old Texas-born barber. Maggie Jackson was 35, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. With them lived Maggie's mother, Fannie James, a 58-year old Alabama-born widow with no occupation listed. They had no children listed with them.

His 1917 World War I draft registration card shows that William Carlton Jackson was living in Marble Falls, Texas, where he worked as a barber. He had been born in Burnet County, Texas in 1895, and was married with one child. He was tall with a medium build, black hair and black eyes.

His 1957 death certificate shows that William Carlton Jackson was born in 1895 in Burnet County, and was the owner of the Allandale Barber Shop. He was living at 5704 Wynona Avenue at the time of his death.

Maggie Viola Jackson's 1969 death certificate shows that she was living at 1606 Nash Avenue in South Austin at the time of her death. She was a widowed housewife who had been born in Travis County.

He had been a resident of Austin 22 years years and lived at 5704 Wynona. He was a member of Brentwood Church of Christ and Woodmen of the World.

Survivors include his wile, one son, C. E. Jackson of Riverside, Calif, four brothers, S. M. Jackson of Okemah, Okla, Luther Jackson and Conner Jackson, both of Marble Falls, and Alvin Jackson of Austin, one sister, Mrs. Bessie Phillips of Boerne; and one grandson.
