The current social service agreement with Central Texas Food Bank, Inc. (CTFB) was awarded as a result of Austin Public Health Department submission of the Self-Sufficiency Request for Applications (RFA) in Fiscal Year 2013-2014. Services began on September 1, 2015 for an initial 37-month term ending on September 30, 2018 in the amount of \$681,141, with three 12-month extension options in the amount of \$227,047 per extension option. Amendment No. 1 included a one-time \$42,720 administrative increase that expanded Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) outreach and enrollment during the 12-month period of October 1, 2015 through September 30, 2016. Amendment No. 2 was an administrative increase of \$15,280 that expanded the Food Distribution program during the 12-month period of October 1, 2015 through September 30, 2016. Amendment No. 3 was an administrative increase of \$43,626 to maintain the previous fiscal year's expansion of SNAP outreach and enrollment during the 12month period of October 1, 2016 through September 30, 2017. Amendment No. 4 was an administrative change to modify the vendor's name from Capital Area Food Bank, Inc. to Central Texas Food Bank, Inc.

The additional funding in this request is a result of funding approved by Council during the Fiscal Year 2016-2017 budget adoption process. Previously, in Fiscal Year 2014-2015 Council allocated funding to increase SNAP outreach

and enrollment efforts for City-eligible program participants that resulted in an annual increase to the agreement with CTFB of \$42,720 beginning in Fiscal Year 2015-2016. Additionally, Council allocated funding during the Fiscal Year 2015-2016 and Fiscal Year 2016-2017 budget adoption processes for current social service providers for a "cost of doing business" adjustment resulting in an annual increase to the agreement with CTFB of \$16,186 beginning in Fiscal Year 2015-2016 and an additional \$6,577 per year beginning in Fiscal Year 2016-2017.
