

## A LOOK AHEAD TO 2018

Looking ahead to the 2018 mid-term elections, 33 Senate seats will be contested:

- 8 Senate seats held by Republicans
- 25 Senate seats held by Democrats

One Republican, Senator Dean Heller of Nevada (47.9% Clinton), will be running for reelection in a state won by Hillary Clinton. 10 Democrats will be running for reelection in states won by President Trump:

- Tammy Baldwin (Wisconsin Trump 47.9%)
- Sherrod Brown (Ohio Trump 52.1%)
- Bob Casey (Pennsylvania Trump 48.8%)
- Joe Donnelly (Indiana Trump 57.2%)
- Heidi Heitkamp (North Dakota Trump 64.1%)
- Joe Manchin (West Virginia Trump 68.7%)
- Claire McCaskill (Missouri Trump 57.1%)
- Bill Nelson (Florida Trump 49.1%)
- Debbie Stabenow (Michigan Trump 47.6%)
- Jon Tester (Montana Trump 56.5%)

## 115<sup>TH</sup> CONGRESS, 1<sup>ST</sup> SESSION: KEY ISSUES

#### Budget

 Sequestration is back for FY 2018 and the Administration is reportedly preparing an austere budget proposal, putting pressure on all discretionary spending, especially core local government programs

#### Tax

- Comprehensive tax reform may have momentum; for cities, tax exemption for municipal bonds is a key issue
- Infrastructure
  - Major infrastructure investment package?
  - Aviation reauthorization
  - National Flood Insurance Program reauthorization

#### Local Control

- Telecommunications: ROW & zoning
- Sales tax fairness
- Immigration (Sanctuary Cities)
- Public Safety
  - Criminal justice reform
  - Grant funding
- Regulations
  - President Trump and congressional Republicans have promised to undo most of President Obama's regulatory agenda. Major issues include clean air, clean water, fair housing, and workplace issues.

## THE AGENDA FOR THE 'FIRST 100 DAYS' (AND BEYOND)

Priority items, in descending order of agreement (and likelihood of enactment) between the new Administration and Congress include:

- Repeal (and replace or repair?) the Affordable Care Act
- Tax Reform
- Immigration (Sanctuary Cities)
- Discretionary spending
  - Eliminate sequester cap for Defense
  - Increase domestic security spending (immigration and border security)
  - Implement Heritage Foundation/Republican Study Committee budgets that call for major cuts to non-Defense discretionary spending, including eliminating numerous agencies and programs

## BOTTOM LINE – WHAT IT COULD MEAN FOR CITIES

- Preserving the tax exemption for municipal bonds will be a priority challenge for local governments.
- Preserving funding for core local government programs will be the second biggest challenge for local governments.
- The repeal of the Affordable Care Act, entitlement reform, and cuts to other social service programs could create long-term challenges for local budgets.
- Local governments will have to closely track *regulatory reform*, keeping an especially close eye on the FCC.

## TRANSPORTATION FUNDING

- Expect FY 2016 Funding through FY 2017
- FY 2018 Fasten Your Seatbelts!!
  - Rumor: President Trump will seek \$10 trillion in reductions over the next ten years
  - Rumor: Phase out federal transit funding and eliminate Capital Investment Grants

## CHAO-LED DOT

- Favors Outcome-Based Rulemaking
- TIGER continued support for program but not clear on what projects will be eligible
- Autonomous Vehicles (AVs), Drones, Emerging Technology
  - Catalyst for Implementation

- Work with public and private parties
- Deferred on how she would define Federal, State and local roles on regulating AVs, Vehicleto-Vehicle (V2V) and Vehicle-to-Infrastructure (V2I) technology and policies

## TRUMP INFRASTRUCTURE PLAN

- Includes aviation, ports, schools, power grid, highways and bridges transit is never mentioned
- Forming "Infrastructure Council"
  - Known members include Secretary Chao and NYC developers
  - Floated a set of projects in December 2016 totaling \$137.5 B
- Potential Elements
  - Repatriation of foreign assets held overseas with reduced tax rate
  - Infrastructure Bank that would select projects to be built
  - Expanded financing and tax credits for private sector investment

## TRUMP INFRASTRUCTURE PLAN (CONTINUED)

- Discretionary funding is part of the plan
  - House Speaker Ryan each dollar of discretionary funding must be matched by \$40 of private sector financing
- Overcome Congressional Republican reticence to support American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) II

## TRANSPORTATION POLICY ISSUES FOR CITY

- Smart Cities does it survive?
- Support for AVs but local impacts on land use, parking, and economic development omitted from discussion.
