Hyde Park

PROPOSAL

Construct a two-story addition to the rear of a ca. 1908 one-story house that is contributing to the historic district.

PROJECT SPECIFICATIONS

The applicant proposes the construction of a two-story addition to the rear of a one-story house in the Hyde Park Historic District. The proposed addition will have front-facing gables and will add 709 square feet of space to the house. The addition will have horizontal wood siding, painted to match the existing house. The roof will have composition shingles to match those on the existing house and fenestration in the addition will be 4:4 painted wood single-hung windows to complement those on the existing house. The new column wraps specified in the application will be routine reproduction and replacement in kind. There will be a new metal railing installed on the front porch.

STANDARDS FOR REVIEW

The following Hyde Park Historic District Design Standards are applicable to this project:

- Do not destroy the distinguishing original qualities or character of a building, structure, or site and its environment. Avoid the removal or alteration of any historic material or distinctive architectural features.
- Recognize all buildings, structures, and sites as products of their own time. Do not construct alterations which have no historical basis and which seek to create an earlier appearance.
- Repair, rather than replace deteriorated architectural features wherever possible. In the event replacement is necessary, the new material should match the material being replaced in composition, design, color, texture, and other visual qualities. Base the repair or replacement of missing architectural features on accurate duplications of features, substantiated by historical, physical, or pictorial evidence rather than on conjectural designs or the availability of different architectural elements from other buildings or structures.
- Construct additional so as to require the removal or modification of a minimum of historic fabric. Do not construct additions which will require the removal of any portion of the front façade. Design additions to existing residential buildings to reflect the form and style of the existing house.
- Locate new additional and alterations to the rear or rear side of the building so that they will be less visible from the street.
- Make the pitch and height of the roof of the addition compatible to that of the existing house. Make windows visible from the street on any addition compatible with those on the existing house in terms of sash configuration, proportion, spacing, and placement. Use exterior siding materials on the addition which match or are compatible with that of the existing house.

- Design additions to have the same floor-to-ceiling height as the existing house. Locate second story additions at least 15 feet back from the front house wall (the exterior wall closest to the street). Design additions so that they do not overwhelm the original building. Do not raise a first story to become a second story.
- Recommendations include:
 - Extend the existing roof line in the rear of the house to accommodate an addition wherever possible.
 - Consider adding one-story additions to one-story houses.
 - Wherever possible, build additions in existing attic space without raising the roof height. Consider the construction of attic dormers opening to the side or rear of the house to open underused attic space. Design side wall heights on second floor additions to be in scale and proportion to the original house.
 - Where attic heights are adequate to support second-floor living space, dormers or rear additions that do not exceed the original roof ridge height are preferable, as are side walls that maintain the same proportions.
 - Do not locate windows so as to invade the privacy of neighboring properties.




COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Adolph Koch (ca. 1908 – ca. 1911)

The 1910 U.S. Census shows Adolf and Mary F. Koch at this address. Adolf Koch was 33, had been born in Switzerland, and was a mailing clerk at the Post Office. Mary Koch was 27, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had 2 children: Jennie, 5; and Adolph, 2. Both children had been born in Texas.

The 1920 U.S. Census shows Adolph and Mary F., Koch as the owners of the house at 42205 Avenue F. Adolph Koch was 43, had been born in Alsace-Lorraine, and was the superintendent of mail at the Post Office. Mary F. Koch was 37, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had 2 children: Genevieve, 15; and Louis M., 1. Both children had been born in Texas. Adolph Koch immigrated to the United States in 1883 and was a naturalized citizen.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Adolph and Mary Koch as the owners of the house at 4205 Avenue F, which was worth \$8,000. Adolph Koch was 53, had been born in Alsace-Lorraine, and was the superintendent of mails at the Post Office. Mary Koch was 47, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had 2 children: Genevieve Koch, 25, a stenographer for a state office; and Louis Koch, 12. Both had been born in Texas.

ADOLPH KOCH

Adolph Koch, 88, of 4205 Avenue F, died in a local hospital Tuesday.

A resident of Austin most of his life, Koch was retired as Superintendent of Mails here.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mary Koch, Austin; son, Louis M. Koch, Houston; daughter, Mrs. Genevieve Littlejohn, Austin; son, Louis M. Koch, Houston; and sister, Miss Lillie Koch, Austin.

Funeral services are pending at Weed-Corley Funeral Home.

Funeral for Adolph Koch, 88, retired superintendent of mails for the Austin Post Office, will be Thursday at 2 p.m. at Weed-Corley Funeral Home. He died Tuesday in a local hospital.

Rev. Charles A. Sumners, rector of St. David's Episcopal Church, will officiate. Burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery.

Koch was born in Lorach, Alsace-Lorraine, France, and came to Austin in 1882 from Rheinfelden, Switzerland, with his father, Charles Louis Koch and sister, Tillie Koch.

He started work in the Austin Post Office in 1891 at the age of 14 as a special delivery messenger and advanced to different posts as substitute clerk, mailing clerk, chief mailing clerk and finally as superintendent of mails — the office he held until his retirement in 1943 after working in the Austin Post Office for 52 years.

Koch was a charter member and one of the organizers of the Texas Branch No. 9, National Association of Postal Supervisors of Mails. He was an honorary member of the National Clerks Association, a 50-year Mason and a life member of Austin Lodge No. 12, AF&AM.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mary Wilcox Koch of Austin; son, Louis M. Koch of Houston; daughter, Mrs. Genevieve Littlejohn of Austin; sister, Miss Tillie Koch of Austin, and three grandchildren.

1920 U.S. Census – Roy and Lula Cochran

The 1920 U.S. Census shows Roy A. and Lula May Cochran as the owners of this house. Roy A. Cochran was 31, had been born in Texas to a Kentucky-born father and an Indiana-born mother, and was an auditor for the federal government. Lula May Cochran was 25, had been born in Texas to Missouri-born parents, and had no occupation listed. They had a daughter, Isabella, 6, who had been born in Texas. By 1930, according to the census report of that year, Roy A. and Lula D. Cochran were living at 1805 Dam Boulevard in a house they owned, and which was worth \$3,000. Roy A. Cochran was a 4-year-old Texas-born book-keeper for a road machinery firm; Lula D. Cochran was 38 and had no occupation listed. Their daughter, Isabella, was 16, and had no occupation listed.

James M. and Mattie Reynolds (ca. 1921 – ca. 1949)

The 1910 U.S. Census shows James M. and Mattie Reynolds living in Lampasas, Texas. James M. Reynolds was 39, had been born in Mississippi, and was a salesman for a general store. Mattie Reynolds was 33, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had 3 children: Imogene, 13; Eugene, 11; and Corine, 8. All of the children had been born in Texas.

In 1920, according to the census report of that year, James and Mattie Reynolds were living at 509 E. 16th Street in Austin. James Reynolds was 45, had been born in Mississippi, and was a motorman for the streetcar line. Mattie Reynolds was 44, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. With them lived a daughter, Corinne, 18, who had been born in Texas, and was a stenographer for the state.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows James M. and Mattie Reynolds as the owners of this house, which was worth \$7,500. James M. Reynolds was 59, had been born in Alabama, and was a

solicitor for a dry cleaners. Mattie Reynolds was 56, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had a daughter, Corrine, 29, who had been born in Texas, and was a stenographer for a dry cleaner.

James M. and Mattie Reynolds appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owners of this house, which was worth \$3,000. James M. Reynolds was 70, had been born in Mississippi, and worked in the parcel post department of a dry cleaning shop. Mattie Reynolds was 64, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. Their daughter, Corene, 30, had been born in Texas and was a stenographer for a dry cleaning establishment.

MRS. MATTIE REYNOLDS

Mrs. Mattie Eugenia Reynolds, 71, an Austin resident for 33 years, died Saturday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Kelly Smith of 4200 Avenue F. She was born in Leander and was a daughter of Luther Faubion, one of the early settlers of Williamson county. Mrs. Reynolds was a member of the First Methodist church, West Austin Study club, United Daughters of the Confederacy, Church Council of Women, Helping Hand, Kings Daughters and a leader in the WCTU.

Survivors are her husband, James M. Reynolds of Austin; one son, E. F. Reynolds of Houston; two daughters, Mrs. Kelly Smith and Miss Corene Reynolds of Austin, and one sister, Mrs. R. L. Carothers of Dallas.

The body will lie in state at the residence until Monday noon. Funeral services will be held at the Weed-Corley Funeral home at 2 p. m. Monday. Dr. Kenneth Pope and Dr. W. R. White will officiate, and burial will be in Oakwood cemetery.
