# Colorado Conversion to Two-Way Traffic

## History

- 2002 Downtown Austin Mobility Plan
  - Modeled entire grid
  - Colorado & Brazos highest ranked for conversion after Cesar Chavez
- 2006 Cesar Chavez converted to 2-way
- 2011 Downtown Austin Plan
  - Adopted by Council
  - Also recommended 2-way streets
- 2015 Brazos converted to 2-way
  - From Cesar Chavez to East 6<sup>th</sup> St
  - Conversion went very smoothly
  - No appreciable increase in delays

#### Proposed Conversion

- Colorado will be 2-way from Cesar Chavez to 9<sup>th</sup> St
- 9<sup>th</sup> St to 10<sup>th</sup> St will remain one way southbound
  - The Governor's Mansion and DPS raised concerns
  - We hope to find a solution in the near future and finish the conversion
- Colorado will be one lane in each direction
- Left turn lanes will be maintained at 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup>, and 7<sup>th</sup>



## Project Goals & Impacts

- The conversion will improve mobility and traffic flow through Downtown Austin
- The project provides an additional north-south corridor for improved access and flexibility to destinations along Colorado
- Traffic signs, markings, and signals will be modified to accommodate the conversion
- Minimal impacts to on-street parking will result
- ATD will work with garage operators to ensure that traffic flow in and out of adjacent garages is accommodated

#### Timeline

- Colorado reconstruction began in 2015
- Project moving toward completion in Summer 2017
  - July 26<sup>th</sup> DAA organized stakeholder meeting
  - Early August Colorado reconstruction finished
  - Week of August 8<sup>th</sup> East 5<sup>th</sup> St converted to 2-way
  - Late August Colorado 2-way conversion
