HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION JULY 24, 2017 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2017-0299 2508 GALEWOOD PLACE

PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1950 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, shallow hipped roofed brick veneered house with double sets of multi-light, metal framed casement windows; the principal entry is framed in wood siding.

RESEARCH

The house was built by local contractor Frank Rundell in 1950. The first owners and occupants were Professor Gordon V. Anderson and his wife, Atha; they lived here from around 1950 to around 1970. Professor Anderson was a native of Nebraska, and after receiving his graduate degrees and teaching elsewhere, he joined the faculty of the University of Texas in 1947, where he taught educational psychology. He was the director of the Testing and Counseling Center from 1958 to 1965, and chair of the Department of Educational Psychology from 1965 to 1972. He retired in 1979.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house is beyond the bounds of any City survey to date.


The house does not meet the criteria for landmark designation as set forth in City Code:

- a. **Architecture.** The house is a brick-veneered ca. 1950 house with minimal International Style details, especially in the expanses of metal-framed multilight casement windows. However, the house does not qualify as a historic landmark for its architectural merit.
- b. **Historical association**. The house was the long-time home of Professor Gordon V. Anderson, a professor of educational psychology at the University of Texas, but there do not appear to be significant historical associations.
- c. **Archaeology**. The house was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
- d. **Community value**. The house does not possess a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group.
- e. **Landscape feature**. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, then relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package.

Gordon V. and Atha Anderson (ca. 1950 – ca. 1970)

Gordon V. Anderson, PhD

Gordon V. Anderson, PhD, professor emeritus of educational psychology at the University of Texas, died Wednesday, March 13, 1991.

A memorial service will be held at First English Lutheran Church, Saturday, March 16th at 3:00 PM, with the Reverend Robert Karli officiating and Reverend Vance Daniel delivering the eulogy.

Dr. Anderson was born April 6, 1910, at Wausa, Nebraska. He received his AB degree from Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois, MA in psychology from the University of Nebraska, and PhD in psychology from the University of Minnesota.

He was married to Atha Grothe, November 28, 1935. They have two children, a son, Roger Kent; and a daughter, Sally Marie.

He was editor and reporter for the Wausa Gazette five years; taught high school at Hazleton, Iowa two years; and was employed as an interviewer for the Nebraska State Employment Service, Norfolk and Lincoln, for five years.

At the University of Minnesota, Dr. Anderson was assistant professor of psychology and acting director of the Student Counseling Center, and also served as director of the statewide testing program. He was assistant professor of psychology, Northwestern University, 1945-47; and joined the faculty of the University of Texas in 1947. He was director of the Testing and Counseling Center, 1958-65, and chairman of the Department of Educational Psychology, 1965-72; and retired in 1979.

Dr. Anderson authored numerous articles in professional journals and was active in learned and professional societies: state, regional and national. He was president of the American College Personnel Association, 1953-55; president of the Texas Psychological Association in 1951, and president of the Southwestern Psychological Assocoation in 1957. He was Fellow of the American Psychological Association, and for several years a member of the Evaluation Committee for the Association. He was a Diplomate in Counseling of the American Board of Professional Psychology. At the University of Texas, he was a member of

the Faculty Senate and of the University Council for several terms, and was a member of the Graduate Assembly.

Three summers were spent as a visiting professor at the University of California, Berkeley, the University of California at Los Angeles, and the University of Southern California. A year and a half was spent as a senior project director for CTB/McGraw-Hill, Monterey, California.

At Nebraska, he was elected a member of Psi Chi honorary fraternity in psychology; at Minnesota, elected to Sigma Xi, honorary science fraternity, and at Texas, elected to Phi Kappa Phi, honorary scholastic fraternity, and to Phi Delta Kappa, honorary education fraternity. In 1969, Dr. Anderson received the Augustana Alumni Outstanding Achievement Award. Throughout his life, he had a deep interest in music, participating in school and community bands, orchestras and choruses. A high spot of his college experience was a tour of eastern United States, Sweden and Denmark, with the college band as a solo clarinetist.

A lifelong Lutheran, Dr. Anderson was active in the church, serving several terms on the First English Lutheran Church Council, taught Sunday school and was director of Christian Education; was for several years a member of the Synodical Commission for Professional Leadership; served several terms on the Board of Directors for Central Lutheran Seminary; and on the board for the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago.

Survivors include his wife, Atha; son, Dr. Roger K. Anderson of Tyler; daughter, Sally Marie Canovas of Humble; grandson, Peter Canovas III; and brother, Cedric of Hastings, Nebraska.

All of his family members are proud to have shared his life, and grateful to have been blessed with the gift of his love.
