HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION NOVEMBER 27, 2017 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2017-0497 501 E. MARY STREET

PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1929 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, clipped side-gabled, frame house with a partial-width, frontgabled independent porch on ornamental metal posts; single and paired 1:1 fenestration. The house has synthetic siding and an artificial stone wainscot, but appears to have its original windows.

RESEARCH

The ca. 1929 house was first occupied by Clyde and Thelma Milstead, who lived here until around 1932. Clyde Milstead was the manager of Merchants Transfer and Storage Company. The house was then rented by a traveling salesman, Joseph W. Day, and his wife, Ruby, then by an electrician, followed by a contractor. Albert F. and Marian Byars then lived here from around 1938 until around 1946. Albert F. Byars was a cook and chef; from the late 1940s until his death in 1970, he operated Flossie's Café, his nickname namesake, at 2801 S. Lamar Boulevard (now the Thundercloud Subs at S. Lamar and Manchaca Road). Robert T. Williams, a printer for the Steck Company, and his wife, Marie, purchased the house in 1947, and lived there the rest of their lives. Marie Williams passed away in 2017.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house was listed with no priority for research in the Comprehensive Cultural Resources Survey (1984). The house was listed as contributing in the 2009 inventory for the application for a local historic district in Bluebonnet Hills.

Staff has evaluated the house under the criteria for designation set forth in the City Code and has determined that this house does not meet the threshold for individual landmark designation:

- Architecture. The house is a frame house dating from 1930 with no architectural distinction.
- **Historical association**. The house was a rental property for the first 17 years of its existence, with short-term renters until around 1938. It was the only rental property of all the houses in the 500 blocks listed in the 1930 U.S. Census report. The most prominent of the renters were Albert F. "Flossie") and Marion Byars, who lived here between 1938 and 1946. He was a chef who went on to establish his own restaurant after moving from this house. The longest-term owner of the property, Robert T. Williams, was a printer for the Steck Company. There do not appear to be significant historical associations.
- **Archaeology**. The house was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
- **Community value**. The house does not possess a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group.

• Landscape feature. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, then relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package. The house does not meet the criteria for individual designation as a historic landmark, although it could be contributing to a historic district incorporating the 500 block of E. Mary Street.

> We met with the neighborhood representatives and the buyers of 501 W. Mary, and honestly I don't think there's a lot of common ground here. We're going to review the proposed design standards with the buyer, but one of the neighbors threatened to "fight them if they don't like the design standards" being proposed, so it set a bad tone.

E-mail from James Bilodeau, of the E. Mary Street Historic District Team:

Separately, we did meet with the potential buyers of 501 E. Mary St. and the Joseph Brothers. Unfortunately, not much progress was made. Our hope was to offer any help, resources to encourage the buyers to rehabilitate the house. We had reached out to Kate Singleton at Preservation Austin and she had offered to line up an architect free of charge that could show the potential to incorporate the existing structure into a new design. We also came prepared to discuss the tax advantages of rehabilitation within an LHD that would make rehabilitation of the existing structure more cost effective than a full demolition and rebuild. Unfortunately they were not willing to even discuss either of these options.

We sent them the proposed Design Guidelines for the LHD and are now hoping to explore ways in which any new construction could achieve some degree of compatibility with the LHD. We're hoping that they'll be willing to explore this, even if it's just on the level of massing and setbacks. As we have with other homes in the neighborhood, we're of course happy to work with them should they need any variances to accomplish this.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

Clyde E. and Thelma Milstead (ca. 1929 - ca. 1932)

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Clyde E. and Thelma D. Milstead as the renters of this house. Clyde Milstead was 27, had been born in Texas to Mississippi-born parents, and was the manager of a transfer and storage company. Thelma Milstead was 28, and had been born in Texas. She had no occupation listed. They had no children listed with them. The Milsteads are the only renters listed in the 500 block of E. Mary Street in the 1930 census report.

By 1940, according to the census report of that year, Clyde E. and Thelma Milstead were renting the house at 1905 Travis Heights Boulevard. Clyde Milstead was the owner/manager of a storage and transfer company. He and Thelma had a son, Clyde, Jr., 8.

Clyde Milstead died at Kerrville State Hospital in 1961. He was listed as a widowed seasonal laborer whose permanent address was 704 S. 1st Street in Austin. He was born in Austin in 1902.

MILSTEAD ANDERSON

Albert F. and Marian Byars (ca. 1938 - ca. 1946)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Floyd [Albert F.] and Marian Byars as the renters of this house. Floyd Byars was 36, had been born in Texas, and was the chef in a cafe. Marian Byars was 35, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. With them lived a step-daughter, Nancy Marian Davis, 17, and a step-son, Dewey Davis, 15. Both had been born in Texas.

In 1930, Floyd Byars was living in Los Angeles, California, where he was living as a lodger. The 1930 census report does not show his occupation. The 1920 U.S. Census shows Floyd Byars as the 17-year old son of John and Mary Byars, who lived on the State Epileptic Colony near Abilene in Taylor County, Texas. Floyd is shows as a farm laborer. His father, a native of Louisiana, was a dairyman and his mother, who had been born in Missouri, was a cook. He had an older sister, Clem, who was a nurse.

Albert Floyd Byars' 1970 death certificate shows that he was born in Rosebud, Texas in 1904, and was living at 2708 Del Curto Road in Austin at the time of his death. He was the owner of a restaurant, and is buried in Blanco, Texas.
