## PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1933 house.

## ARCHITECTURE

One-story, irregular-plan, stucco-coated frame Spanish Colonial Revival-styled house with a flat roof with parapets, single, double, and triple modern casement-style replacement windows; a shed-roofed round-arched entry with a tile roof; and a round-arched extended wall with a scalloped top forming the garden entry to the left of the principal block of the house; two-story front-gabled stuccoed addition to rear.

## RESEARCH

The house appears to have been built around 1933 as a small, wood house that acquired its current stucco finish between 1935 and 1962, according to Sanborn maps. The first owners and occupants were C. Merle and Ophelia Goodnight. C. Merle Goodnight was the manager of a filling station; Ophelia Goodnight worked at J.C. Penney. They only lived here for a few years; the house was a rental property by 1936. Tenants included a map supervisor for the State Highway Department then the proprietor of an auto body shop. Sam Henry Holt and his wife, Fellie, are listed as the owners and occupants from around 1946 until around 1962. The Holts moved here from Houston; Sam Henry Holt was a plasterer. After they moved out in the early 1960s, the house became a rental property again.

## Staff Comments

The house is beyond the bounds of any City survey to date.
Staff has evaluated this house for designation as a historic landmark and has determined that the house does not meet the criteria for landmark designation as set forth in City Code:
a. Architecture. The house is a nice example of Spanish Colonial Revival architecture, but the original windows have been replaced with vinyl windows, resulting in a very noticeable loss of integrity of materials that has compromised its architectural significance.
b. Historical association. The people with the longest period of tenancy in the house was a plasterer and his wife; there do not appear to be significant historical associations.
c. Archaeology. The house was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
d. Community value. The house does not possess a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group.
e. Landscape feature. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package. The house does not meet the criteria for individual designation as a historic landmark.

## BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

## Don W. and Vergie Rooney (ca. 1936 - ca. 1942)

Don Rooney appears in the 1930 U.S. Census as the 27 -year old son of Essie Rooney who owned her home worth $\$ 20,000$ in Fort Stockton, Texas. Don Rooney was single, had been born in Texas, and was a draughtsman for the State Highway Department. Essie Rooney, 54, was a Texas-born widow with no occupation listed. Don Rooney died in 1984 in Houston. Vergia Rooney died in 1997 in Houston.

## Samuel and Fellie Holt (ca. 1946 - ca. 1962)

Samuel and Fillie Holt appear in the 1940 U.S. Census of Precinct 6 of Harris County, Texas, where they owned their home. Samuel H. Holt was 28, had been born in Texas, and was a plasterer. Fillie Holt was 29, had been born in Texas, and was a housewife. They had 2 children: Lilla, 7; and Kenneth 3. Both children had been born in Texas.
