Partnership Goals

1. Enhance and expand public use of Parks' grounds and facilities
2. Encourage active recreation and healthy lifestyles
3. Improve environmental stewardship through public participation and education
4. Celebrate arts, culture, and history to build community
5. Maximize public benefit at minimum taxpayer cost
6. Bring features or services to the parks system that are not already in place



Partnerships within Austin Parks and Recreation

Neighborhood and Community Partnerships

- Serve as advocates and stewards for their local park or facility

Nonprofit Conservancy Partnerships

- Nonprofits
- Conservancies
- Mission-aligned with PARD
- Dedicated to a particular park or facility, specific types of amenities, or programs throughout the park system

Business Partnerships

- Corporations
- Local businesses
- Provide a wide range of activities including:
 - Park improvements
 - Maintenance and management
 - Programs and services
 - Donations and sponsorships

Public Private Partnerships

Public Private Partnerships typically involve a government agency contracting with a private partner to design, construct, operate, maintain, and/or manage a facility or system in whole, or in part, that provides a public service. This includes leveraging the partner's skills or assets to perform an aspect of the project.

Keys to success:

- Public Sector Champion/Political leadership
- Stable Public Sector Organizational Structure
- Comprehensive Contractual Plan
- Dedicated Income Stream
- Stakeholder Support and Communication
- Proper Partner Selection
