HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION JULY 23, 2018 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2018-0311 2204 San Antonio Street

PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1968 building.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, flat-roofed building built in the Neoeclectic Mansard style. The building is clad in brick masonry and has an arched colonnade that spans the central bay. Fenestration includes fixed aluminum-sash arched windows and fully glazed paired aluminum doors.

RESEARCH

The building was constructed around 1968 following a capital campaign by 54 Baptist churches in Austin. J. C. Construction Co. was the general contractor; no architect is listed. The building has served as the Baptist Student Center for its entire life, hosting classes, gatherings, coordination of local community service programs and international mission projects, and religious and community events.

STAFF COMMENTS

The building may meet one criterion for designation as a historic landmark, but it does not appear to meet the designation threshold of two criteria.

Designation Criteria—Historic Landmark


- 1) The building is 50 years old, having been constructed around 1968.
- 2) The building retains a high degree of integrity.
- 3) Properties must meet two historic designation criteria for landmark designation (City of Austin Land Development Code, Section 25-2-352). The property appears to demonstrate significance according to one criterion.
 - a. **Architecture.** The house is built in the Neoeclectic Modern style and does not appear to possess architectural distinction.
 - b. **Historical association**. The building does not appear to have significant historical associations that contributed significantly to the history of the city, state, or nation; or represent a significant portrayal of the cultural practices or way of life of a definable group of people in a historic time.
 - c. **Archaeology**. The property was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
 - d. **Community value**. For the past fifty years, the building has been home to the Baptist Student Center (or Union), which has hosted programs, classes, and events. In its strategic location near UT and purpose-built facilities to guide and minister to Baptist and other students, the property may possess a unique location and physical characteristics that contribute to the character, image, or cultural identity of the community, Austin, or Texas. However, it should be noted that since the building was constructed just fifty years ago, the community value has developed outside of the historic period.

e. Landscape feature. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive reuse of the building. If the Commission votes to release the permit, then staff recommends relocation over demolition, and completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center.


Background Research

The existing building is the third home to the Baptist Student Union of Texas. The Union's first purpose-built home was a one-story building at 415 W. 22nd Street constructed in 1949 "to meet the spiritual and fellowship needs of Baptist students of college age." By 1957, the Union had outgrown its headquarters and moved into the Brackenridge Home, a threestory building at 2204 San Antonio Street.

In 1967, 54 local Baptist churches undertook a \$100,000 capital campaign to fund a new building. The campaign chair noted that the "student Union is the contact point between the students and the Baptist church of the community," while the director of the UT Baptist Student Union called the Brackenridge Home "woefully outworn, outdated and totally inadequate to house the type of program needed... The inadequate facilities of the present student center and the growing student population demand immediate action and concern on the part of each church and every Baptist."

In 1968, the new center was constructed at a cost of \$152,000. The building included a range of spaces, including classrooms; gathering, social, and study areas; offices; and a library. Over the next decades, the building would host classes and events for Baptist students and others, with financial support from the Baptist General Convention of Texas and Austin congregations. Community events in the building's early years included an international student tea (1970), a theater production of "The Dead" (1973), Christian music performances (1974 and 1977), and an annual World Fair (mentioned in 1976). A 1974 newspaper article said that the Baptist Student Center "could easily be mistaken for...[a] community service agency" due to its heavy involvement in campus, city, state, and world missions. At the time, programs included Bible studies, tutoring, coordination of community service projects in East Austin and with senior citizens, and international mission projects. "It's a place where you can apply your Christianity," said staffer Ann Moore.

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



This is the third im a series spritual awareness -- and a University of Texas sudent teaching him to use those taiente to serve others. Under any uniter starae, the

Baptisa Student Center could easily be mistaken for any one of a solid list of community service agencies. Dispersing from the 2204 San Antonio headquarters, center students vent those talents not only toward the UT campus but to assorted Austin as well as state and even world roissions. "We want to show people that Jesus Christ is involved in relationships with other people not just the 'religious' side of life," explains center director Carrol Smith. "We're here to reach out, extend, make a friend . . . give him the option of Christ."

Smith, along with Ann Moore, a Baptist stoffer, and a

secretary head the center. Funding comes from the Baptist Geberal Convention of Texas and Austin congregations. Although Tuesday evening worship and

and throughout-the-week 2 ib le study is offered, Smith disagrees the center is a "church."

"We want to relate the life and teachings of Jesus to the educational process ...) guess it's an 'interdependent' philosophy." Activities are not scheduled

an Sunday so that students may attend local worship. Aside from a battalion of en-campus witnesses, the center also offers noon lunch

Bible study, "sandwich seminars," featuring key "sandwich University personalities and an International program. Center students tutor UT foreign students, who must often master English before continuing university education. Volunteers give ano hour a week to meet with a student for conversation.

An international "host" program is also organized in which students find families who will bost a foreigner, having him to disner or sharing activities once a month.

But Smith sees the program mainly as a "growth" center. "We're here to help initiate the Christian experience, but then one of our major responsibilities is a conservation role. We take the faith many students have brought from home, an immature laith, and help them to grow spiritually and to vent that faith toward helping others."

Students currently coordinate five mission projects to East Austin including day work with small children at Montopolis Activity Center and "Iriond" programs for teeragers.


Students also manage "on e do on e" relationships with senior chizens et Governor's Residence Hall, visiting, writing letters and running errands for the residents.

But the Baptists also reach for beyond the auspices of a UT -- or Austin -- community. Three center students last summer served in summer missions in Jordan, Bangladesh and Africa. Six others worked in U.S. missions. -

"We all have certain emotional and physical needs ... We all need a friend," explains Miss Moere. "And here it's all offered. But wealso give discipleship. It's a place where you can apply your Christianity "

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
