**SUMMARY STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Staff cannot recommend the proposed zoning change to designate this house as a historic landmark. While the house has architectural significance, staff cannot justify the historical associations or community value aspects of the case moving forward. However, staff does strongly encourage the property owners to consider rehabilitation and re-use of this house, as it is one of the last remaining houses that tells the story of the E. 6<sup>th</sup> Street corridor.

Architecture, historical associations, and community value.

#### BASIS FOR RECOMMENDATION:

#### Architecture:

One-story, wing-and-gable plan, frame house with a partial-width shed-roofed, independent porch on turned wood posts with ornamental Italianate-style brackets; transom over the front door; single and paired 1:1 fenestration; stone foundation skirting.

### Historical Associations:

The house appears to have been built around 1899; the first owners and occupants were Gus and Ida Anderson, who lived here until 1950. Gus Anderson was born in Sweden, and was a farm laborer before going to work as a fireman for the Austin and Northwestern Railroad, later the Houston and Texas Central Railroad, and later the Southern Pacific Railroad. He retired around 1936, and passed away in 1943. His widow, Ida, also born in Sweden, lived in this house until her death in 1952. One of their daughters, Edith, a public school teacher, lived here until the mid-1960s. The house was then purchased by Felix Benites and his wife, Louise, who lived here in their retirement. Felix Benites had a sewing machine repair business at the house.

#### Community Value:

The Commission voted to initiate the historic zoning case based upon community value as the house represents the lifestyle of Swedish immigrants to Austin, railroad workers who were very populous in this section of East Austin, and for the rapid disappearance of houses of this caliber and vintage on E. 6<sup>th</sup> Street.

#### **BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:**

#### Gus and Ida Anderson (ca. 1899 – ca. 1952)

The 1880 U.S. Census lists Gus Anderson as a 17-year old farm laborer who had been born in Sweden, and living in Austin.

The 1900 U.S. Census lists Gus and Ida Anderson residing at 1803 E. 6<sup>th</sup> Street, the former address for this house, with two daughters, Adga, 6 and Edith, 1. Gus was 35; Ida was 32. Both had been born in Sweden, but their daughters had both been born in Texas. Gus immigrated to the United States in 1887; Ida immigrated in 1885. Gus worked as a locomotive fireman.

The 1910 U.S. Census shows Gus and Ida Anderson at 1803 E. 6<sup>th</sup> Street, the former address for this house. They had six children as well as Louise Johnson, Ida's 69-year old mother living

with them. All of the adults had been born in Sweden; the children had all been born in Texas. Gus is listed as a locomotive fireman.

The 1930 U.S. Census still finds Gus and Ida Anderson at 1803 E. 6<sup>th</sup> Street with two unmarried daughters. Gus worked as a train fireman; the youngest daughter worked as a stenographer.

Gus S. and Ida Anderson appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owners of this house, which was worth \$3,000. Gus S. Anderson was 75, had been born in Sweden, and had no occupation listed. Ida Anderson was 72, had been born in Sweden, and had no occupation listed With them lived two daughters: Agda, 47, who had no occupation listed; and Ida Louise, 32, a stenographer at the State Capitol. Both daughters had been born in Texas.

Gustaf S. Anderson died September 1, 1943 while living in this house. He was born in Sweden in 1864, and was a retired railroad fireman. Ida Helen Anderson died in May, 1952, while living at this address. She was a widowed housewife who had been born in Sweden in 1867.

She had been a resident of Austin for 64 years and was a member of the Central Methodist Church.




Burial will be in the Oakwood Cemetery.
