CATHERINE LAMKIN

Dedicated Employe Retires

"I made \$30 a month when I began my first job with Parks and Recreation. It was a part-time job. And I thought I had some money!"

Catherine Lamkin gazes out the window of the Rosewood Recreatin Center and smiles. It seems that all of her memories give her pleasure.

She hopes to devote part of her upcoming retirement time to

"I want to write two books: one about my mother - she was an exceptional woman - and one about my experiences for 35 years with the Parks and Recreation Department.

The book based on her years with the department would parallel U.S. history during the time, describing her experiences from the 40's through the 70's.

MET LOVELY PEOPLE

"I want to leave some history behind me," she said. "I've

met so many lovely people, and none of them alike.

'Probably the most important thing I've learned in this job is how to treat people. You don't tell people, 'I want to do it this way', instead you say 'We can do it like this'. Sharing with people: that's how to learn."

She graduated from Samuel Huston College and shortly thereafter began working with the City's recreation department.

"It's the only paying job I've ever had - I've had plenty I didn't get paid for - but, you know, I should have been paying the city all this time. I've learned so much.

"My first position was Director of Servicemen's Recreation in 1942. I organized a hostess corps of about 300 girls, and every weekend we would take 40-60 of them to the bases for dances and banquets on Saturdays.

STOPPED SUNDAY DANCES

"After the Doris Miller Auditorium was built, the troops would often come over here for dances. The girls would come too and be the hostesses. We tried having dances on both Saturdays and Sundays, but people didn't like us dancing on Sunday so we stopped.

Mrs. Lamkin continued working long hours through those years, organizing the Officer's Wives Club, the Servicemen's

Wives Club, and working closely with the USO.

"Now I think back on that, and I wonder how I did it. My

husband was very understanding.

'Things were different back then. There were only two negroes in the department: George Mabson and me.' the department grew, black staff members increased too. "Now there are a number of blacks in the department.'

After the war, Lumkin remembers that "everyone was unsettled, out of place, having been stationed in other places. That was when the sit-down strikes began, starting in the eating

places, and then later in the schools and universities.

"Sometimes the young people would march all the way to downtown, and as they would pass, the businessmen would give them some money to buy cokes so they would know that the businessmen approved of what they were doing.

DEMONSTRATIONS

"There were many demonstrations. Sometimes they would call and tell us that they would be demonstrating in the park. Sometimes they would just show up. Everyone was tense then. I talked with Mr. Shettield otten." (Beverly Shettield was director of the Parks and Recreation Department at that time.

"But I thought we met those situations very well. The Rose

wood staff had been integrated a long time before, so we didn't have that problem."

Mrs. Lamkin's eyes flash with energy. "Maybe I'm toolish, but I think every experience we've had has been a good one. You just don't know how to live until you do it!

She thinks that Martin Luther King, Jr.'s death had a calming effect. "It shocked everyone into thinking, and so many young men registered into the colleges - people who had never even thought of it before — because they could.

Catherine Lamkin has done more, though, than just observe and learn. She has been a moving force in many activities during her years with the city. One of her proudest achievements is the Miss East Austin Beauty Pageant.

BEAUTY PAGEANT

"We had been having plays around the pool for sometime when we decided to have the beauty pageant. We started planning it, and then realized that we needed some reason for it. That's when we realized that many of the kids were having trouble going to school, particularly the girls, and we decided to give a scholarship.

The east Austin businessmen donated money for the fund. Some gave \$5 or \$10, but we started the beauty pageant. Everyone enjoyed it so much that we looked for larger places to have it. We had it it the Municipal Auditorium for two spaces

Receiving her Bachelor of Arts degree from Samuel Huston

in 1941 as Director of Women and Girls program at the
Rosewood Activity Center on Austin east side. Since that

Supervisor. Her center has grown from one two story house

Mrs. Lamkin enjoys her work with smaller children and likes to watch them "grow and progress". She hopes in some way her contribution to their lives will help them in the future. She has received numerous awards for her work and has membership in the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, The Links, Inc., The Austin Parks and Recreation Society and served on President Eisenhower's Commission on Women in the Armed Forces.

MRS. CATHERINE B. LAMKIN

A CERTIFIED PROFESSIONAL RECREATION WORKER. RECEIVED HER B.A. DEGREE FROM SAMUEL HUSTON COLLEGE (NOW HUSTON - TILLOTSON). MAJORED IN SOCIOLOGY, MINORED IN PHYSICAL EDUCATION. SHE MARRIED TO THE LATE ATTORNEY KENNETH R. LAMKIN. FOR A TIME SHE WAS A VOLUNTEER LEADER AT ROSEWOOD PARK WHERE SHE WROTE AND HELPED TO PRODUCED "UP FROM SLAVERY", A PAGEANT DEPICTING THE NEGRO DURING THE RECONSTRUCTION PERIOD.

THE FOLLOWING YEAR (1941) SHE WENT TO WORK FOR THE AUSTIN PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT. SHE WAS THE MOVING FORCE WHO HELPED TO RECRUIT A HOSTESS ORGANIZATION OF OVER 350 YOUNG WOMEN AND ORGANIZED THE SERVICEMEN'S WIVES CLUB. ROSEWOOD RECREATION CENTER IS PERHAPS THE HUB OF RECREA-TIONAL ACTIVITY FOR ALL THE CITIZENS OF THE EAST AUSTIN COMMUNITY. A YEAR ROUND PROGRAM IS CONDUCTED WHICH INCLUDES CREATIVE DANCE, ARTS & CRAFTS, CERAMICS, INSTRUMENTAL AND PIANO MUSIC, SEWING, TAILORING, BASKETBALL, FOOTBALL, VOL-LEYBALL, TWIRLING, BATON, BIBLE CLASS, SOFTBALL, TENNIS AND SWIMMING. SPECIAL EVENTS THROUGH-OUT THE YEAR CONSIST OF "THE MISS EAST AUSTIN" PAGEANT, THE BLACK CULTURAL ARTS FESTIVAL, "SHOW TELL AND SELL", SPONSORED BY THE "GO-GET-TERS", A CLUB ORGANIZED FOR SENIOR CITIZENS AND MANY OTHER PROGRAM. SPORTS TOURNAMENTS ALSO DRAW A LARGE NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS AND SPECTATORS.

MRS. LAMKIN HOLDS AWARDS, TROPHIES, CITATIONS AND CERTIFICATES FOR HER COMMUNITY SERVICES. AMONG THEM ARE A CERTIFICATE IN MUNICIPAL RECREATION ADMINISTRATION FROM THE INTERNATION: CITY MANAGER'S ASSOCIATION, A DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CITATION FROM THE PHYSICAL EDUCATION MAJORS CLUB OF HUSTON-TILLOTSON COLLEGE, A CERTIFICATE OF AWARD AND A TWENTY (20) YEAR SERVICE CITATION IN RECOGNITION OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE TO THE MEN AND WOMEN OF AMERICA'S ARMED FORCES THROUGH THE SERVICE ORGANIZATION, INCORPORATED. 



SUBJECT:

Canoe Rental Concession in Zilker Park

The City of Austin issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the Canoe Rental Concession in Zilker Park, an existing concession, on March 23, 1994. One hundred ninety-four (194) notices were sent out including ten (10) MBE and six (6) WBE. Three proposals were received in response to the RFP. An evaluation team made up of representatives from the Purchasing Office, the Budget Office, the Parks and Recreation Department, the Design Commission, and the Parks and Recreation Board reviewed the responses and recommended that the contract be awarded to Austin Canoe and Kayak.

The proposals were evaluated based on the following criteria. The maximum points allowed for each are also show. The proposals were ranked based on 900 points, i.e. 100 points for each of the nine panelists.

Based on the above criteria Austin Canoe and Kayak received the highest number of points of the three concessions.

The proposed contract is for five years with the option to extend for one additional five year period. The concessionaire will perform all normal duties associated with the operation of this type of concession. The concessionaire will provide all personnel, equipment, and products necessary to operate this concession. Canoes as well as one and two person kayaks will be available for rent.

Highlights of the proposed contact include:

the contractor will provide type 3 (lifevest style) lifevests to all

^{*} the contractor will install and maintain an erosion control system in the concession area and along the creekbank

- * the contractor will make available, where possible, canoes and kayaks at little or not cost to non-profit groups
- * the contractor will be responsible for replenishing gravel at the site to mitigate erosion

A bid protest hearing was held on November 14, 1994 at the request of Howard Barnett, Owner of Zilker Park Boat Rentals for Bid Invitation No. HM94300103 for the cance rental concession.

Basis of Protest

The basis of Mr. Barnett's protest is as follows:

- 1. Vagueness of the proposal in the areas of environmental impact, ADA compliance, and safety issues (specifically the safety differences between a type II style life vest (vest style) and the type IV style life vest (horsecollar),
- 2. Questions whether the plans for the reduction of erosion along Barton Springs can be implemented (gravel replenishment and cance movement systems)
- Questions why points for his experience were not given a maximum of 20 points, pointed to letters of recommendation that he felt were not reviewed
- 4. Questions raising fees to the citizens of Anstin as proposed by recommended provider.

Department Response

The Parks and Recreation Department used a standard format for concession proposals. A pre-proposal conference was held on March 29, 1994 which gave individuals the opportunity to ask any questions or voice any concerns on this request for proposal. Although it is acknowledged that Mr. Barnett did not attend this conference, he personally picked up a proposal packet on March 21, 1994, eight days prior to the conference, which clearly stated the time and place for the pre-proposal conference on the front cover.

Mr. Barnett had the opportunity to attend the pre-proposal conference or call either the Buyer or Technical Contact (both listed on the front page of the proposal) for any clarification of the scope of work or procedures. Although some questions were addressed

to, and answered by the Parks and Recreation Department as to ADA requirements, no inquires were made by Mr. Barnett questioning the vagueness of the proposal.

Mr. Barnere's concerns of a type II life vest being as safe as a type IV were discussed with the Coast Guard in Corpus Christi on November 17, 1994. The Coast Guard cautioned that only Coast Guard approved vests should be purchased and that only type II vests were used by own personnel in the Gulf of Mexico. According to the information from the Coast Guard, type II vest are considered safer in rough water because they are easier to put on and adjust for proper fitting.

The feasibility of gravel replenishment and the plans of Austin Canoe and Kayak for canoe movement were studied and discussed with an engineer and a parks manager from the Austin Parks and Recreation Department. Both ideas were felt to be a viable and valid attempt at erosion control, although actual effectiveness could only be determined after implementation. The only stipulation would be that the gravel brought in for replenishment of the creekbed would have to be pre-washed. Mr. Barnett had no proposal for erosion control.


Mr. Barnett was given the greatest number of points of all three proposers for experience. The letters of recommendation of all three proposers were reviewed and taken into account. As does Mr. Barnett, Austin Canoe and Kayak also has various letters of recommendation from groups and individuals for his contributions of time, boats, and instruction to good causes. Austin Canoe and Kayak has shown membership in several canoe and kayak organizations and, like Mr. Barnett, has had years of experience.

It is true that fees were recommended to be increased for cance rental, but if new, improved equipment and creekbank erosion control measures implemented, the Parks and Recreation Department considers the increase is justified. Mr. Barnett proposed a reduction in his current 11% of gross revenue to 10%. This would reduce funds to the City, with no change in the services to the citizens and no erosion control plan.

Findings

The City of Austin, Purchasing Officer has determined that Mr. Barnett, with ample opportunity, did not attempt to solicit any information that would clarify any "vagueness" he felt with the Request for Proposal. The proposed attempts of soil erosion control, although not tested, have been studied by knowledgeable members of the Austin Parks and Recreation Department and found to be valid. Mr. Barnett was given the greatest number of points for experience, in a group of others with years of experience. And, finally, it is true that fees may increase under Austin Canoe and Kayak's proposal, but they will be offset by long term benefits to Zilker Park and the patrons of the concession.

It is recommended that the Evaluation Committee's evaluation to award to Austin Canoe and Kayak be upheld.

SUBJECT: Revision of Ordinances Regarding Aquatics

The Aquatics Advisory Board and Parks and Recreation Department staff have been reviewing the ordinances which affect aquatics and have developed a number of revisions to the current ordinances. A draft of the proposed changes is attached. Our Law Department is currently reviewing these changes, and we will notify you of any additional changes which may be recommended.

The changes relate primarily to the type of certification required of day care center employees and other private swimming instructors. The certification course specified in the current ordinance is no longer available, so the wording has been changed to specify the correct certification courses. Other changes relate to the timing of swimming and swimming instruction. The Department would like greater flexibility in the scheduling.

I recommend that you recommend to Council that these changes be made in the specific ordinances which affect our aquatics program.

Ordinance No. 890511-A

An ordinance amending chapter 10-4 of the city code of 1981 to add section 10-4-2.1 "Restrictions on use of city swimming pools: supervision by day care centers or agencies and private swimming instructors"; providing definitions; providing for pre-registration by day care centers or agencies or by supervisory staff to children; establishing a ratio for requirements for day care center or agency staff members; instructors; establishing a use fee; providing for assignment of day care centers or agencies or private swimming instructors to city swimming pools; providing for enforcement of this section; waiving the rule requiring the reading of ordinances on three separate days; and providing an effective date.

WHEREAS, the City of Austin has limited resources to staff its swimming pools; and

WHEREAS, the City of Austin recognizes the use of the City's pools by day care centers, and the need to provide adequate and safe supervision of children from day care centers or agencies while using City swimming pools in order to safeguard the public health; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUSTIN:

<u>PART 1</u>. Chapter 10-4 of the City of Austin Code of 1981 is amended by adding Section 10-4-2.1 (Restriction on Use of City Swimming Pools: Supervision by Day Care Centers or Agencies and Private Swimming Instructors), as follows:

SECTION 10-4-1.2.

Restrictions on use of city swimming pools: supervision by day care centers or agencies and private swimming instructors.

(a) **DEFINITIONS**

[delete]

- (1) Agency: means organizations that provide supervised care for children [or adults], including, but not limited to, state schools and hospitals, summer day camps, and private schools.
- (2) Day care center: means any person or organization that provides care for six or more children.
- (3) Private Swimming Instructor: means any person providing swim lessons to an individual or groups either for compensation or for free.
- (4) Staff member: any person who is employed by a day care center or agency which uses a City swimming pool.
- (b) In order to use a City swimming pool for either recreational swimming or swimming instruction, any day care center or agency or private swimming instruction class shall be registered before the desired time for use with the Director of the Parks and Recreation Department or his or her designee. Facilities and times for use shall be assigned to each group by the Director of the Parks and Recreation Department or his or her designee.
- (c) The following ratios of supervisory staff to children shall apply to use of City swimming pools by any day care center or agency or private swimming instruction class:

(d) At least one member from any group must be at least 18 years of age, and shall have the following certifications:

[change to: Community Water Safety with water module or equivalent (must be renewed every three years)]

(1) Advanced Life Saving Certification;

[change to: Community Cardiac Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) or equivalent (must be renewed every year)]

(2) [Cardiac Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) Certification]; and

[change to: Community First Aid or equivalent (must be renewed every three years)]

(3) [First Aid Certification]

All day care center or agency staff members must have the following certifications:

[change to: Community Water Safety with water module or equivalent (must be renewed every three years)]
(1) [Emergency Water Safety Certification];

[change to: Community Cardiac Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) or equivalent (must be renewed every year)]

(2) [Cardiac Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) Certification]; and

[change to: Community First Aid or equivalent (must be renewed every three years)]

(3) [First Aid Certification]

Proof of all certifications for staff members must be on file with the Director of Parks and Recreation, or his or her designee, before a day care center or agency may use a City swimming pool for recreation or instruction. All day care center or agency staff shall wear swimsuits and shall participate in the water while supervising the children in the ratio stated in Section 10-4-2.1(b).

- (e) Private swimming instruction, whether offered by a day care center or agency or by an individual [delete]
 swimming instructor, shall be scheduled [only during the morning hours] as specified by the Director of the Parks and Recreation or by his or her designee. All teachers must be Certified Red Cross Water Safety Instructors or equivalent, and proof of certification must be on file with the Director of Parks and Recreation, or his or her designee, before classes may be taught in a City Swimming pool. All private swimming instructors shall wear swimsuits and participate in the water while providing swimming
- lessons.

 (f) Before the first swim lesson has been taught, each day care center or agency or private swimming instructor shall pay to the City of Austin a use fee of \$1.00 per student for each 10 days of swimming

instruction. This use fee is in addition to any other fees which may exist for use of the municipal

swimming pools.

- (g) All day care centers or agencies or private swimming instructors shall be assigned to City swimming pools for both recreational and instructional swimming by the Director of Parks and Recreation Department or his or her designee. Assignment of facilities will be based upon facility size, time of day, bather load, size of the day care center or agency group or private swimming instructor's group, lifeguard staffing, and other relevant criteria.
- (h) Failure of any day care center or agency or private swimming instructor to comply with the provisions of this Section 10-4-2.1 shall result in denial of access to the pool and may result in revocation of the privilege to use City swimming pool facilities. If it is shown that the day care center or agency or private swimming instructor had prior knowledge of this ordinance, revocation will be for a period of not less than 30 days nor more than 90 days. Subsequent violation of this Section 10-4-2.1 by any day care center or agency or private swimming instructor within 24 months shall result in revocation of City swimming pool use privilege for a minimum of one year. Revocation of swimming pool use privileges shall be by written direction of the Director of the Parks and Recreation Department.
- <u>PART 2</u>. That if any provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance, or the application of same to any person or set of circumstances, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void, or in any other manner invalid, the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting this ordinance that no portion hereof, or any provisions or regulations contained herein, shall become inoperative or fail by reason of any unconstitutionality of any other portion hereof; and accordingly all provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable for that purpose.
- <u>PART 3.</u> The requirement imposed by Section 2-2-3 of the Austin City Code of 1981 that this ordinance be read on three separate days shall be waived by the affirmative vote of five members of the City Council to pass this ordinance through more than one reading on a single vote.

PART 4. This ordinance shall be effective ten days following the date of its final passage.

Parks Board Action Regarding Barton Springs Pool Cleaning

Methods

At their regularly scheduled meeting of November 8, 1994, the Parks and Recreation Board viewed a presentation on cleaning methods for Barton; Springs Pool. After the presentation and citizen comment, the Board passed the attached resolution, which recommends using chlorine according to prior cleaning methods.

We have been working with a team composed of representatives of several City of Austin departments and citizens to find methods which will not result in damage to fish or salamanders. Therefore, it is the intent of the Parks and Recreation Department to exhaust all other possible methods before using chlorine again. In fact, we have been testing a number of methods. We also are waiting for a decision on the salamander's status as an endangered species.

Parks and Recreation Board Resolution Barton Springs Pool Maintenance November 8, 1994

WHEREAS the primary concern in the management of the Barton Springs Pool must be the quality and safety of swimming; and

WHEREAS current maintenance procedures are resulting in a shallow end which is dangerously slippery and a deep end which is increasingly clogged with algae and silt; and

WHEREAS there is no reliable evidence that previous maintenance procedures had threatened the viability of the Barton Springs salamander; and

WHEREAS the Barton Springs Salamander has not yet been officially designated as an endangered species;

NOW, therefore, in consideration of the premises, the Parks and Recreation Board recommends to the City Council and the Parks and Recreation Department that it resume previous maintenance procedures, including the controlled use of chlorine in the shallow end and the appropriate dredging of silt in the deep end; and that the impact of these procedures on the Barton Springs salamander be studied.

Phil Friday moved the above resolution be adopted by the Board. Doug Johnston seconded the motion. The vote was 7-1-I. Marianne Dwight abstained.
