WHEREAS the Barton Creek Greenbelt offers unique recreational opportunities to the City of Austin, and

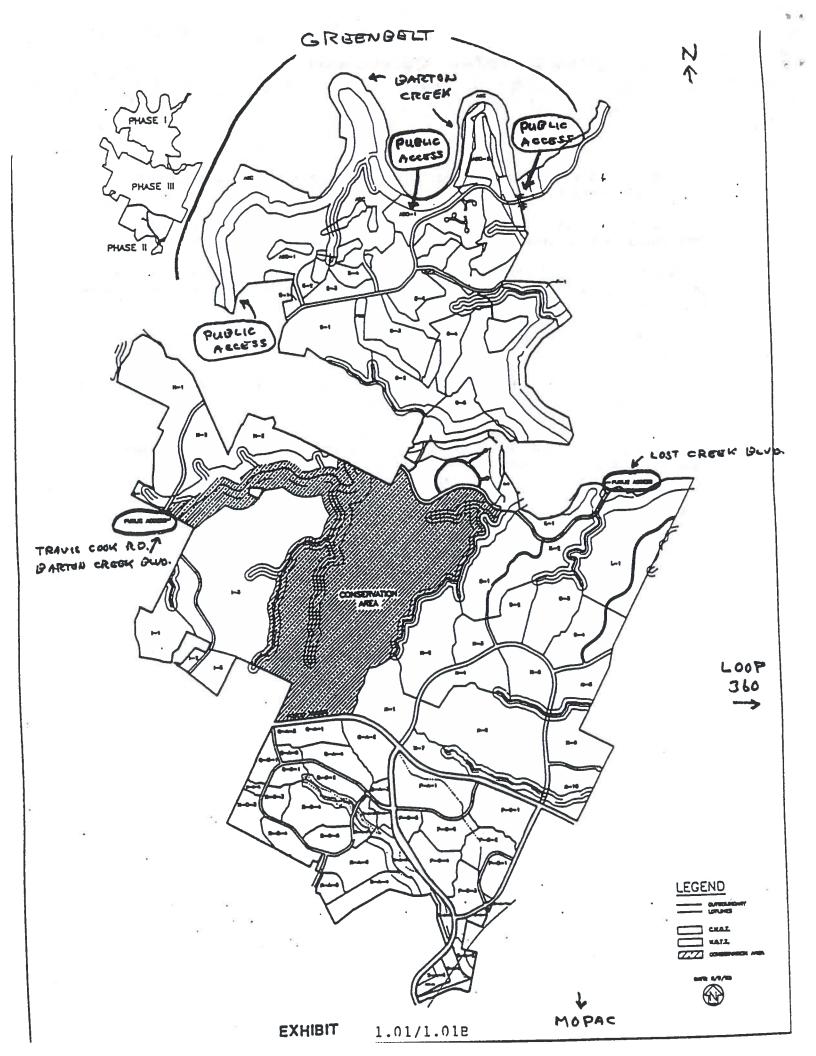
WHEREAS the Greenbelt will have little value to the citizens of Austin if they do not have convenient access to it, and

WHEREAS it is the official policy of the Parks and Recreation Department and Board that public access should be provided at an average of every two (2) miles along the Barton Creek Greenway;

THEREFORE, be it resolved the Parks and Recreation Board strongly recommends to the City Council as follows:

- 1. That Freeport-McMoran be required to provide three (3) additional access points to the Barton Creek Greenbelt as shown on the enclosed map, and
- 2. That the Barton Creek Greenbelt be deeded and dedicated to the City of Austin as parkland and managed by the City of Austin Parks and Recreation Department for appropriate public use with respect to the surrounding environment, and
- 3. That it not be included within the BCCP preserve area or be subject to the BCCP management guidelines.

The vote was 8-0.

Mr. Friday and Members of the Parks Board:

The City Council has set a public hearing on the possible use of parkland for non-parks purposes related to the construction of a transmission line between the Holly Power Plant and the Seaholm Substation at 3:00pm on April 5, 1995. This project was presented to the Board on January 24th of this year. The Electric Utility reported the comments of the Parks Board and other City Boards and Commissions to the City Council on February 1, 1995. I have enclosed a copy of that report for your information. While the Council took action at its March 1, 1995 meeting to set a public hearing on the use of parkland for this project, the Council has not yet made a final decision on the specific route of the line or the mitigation that will be required as part of the project's construction.

In preparation for the April 5th hearing, I would like to bring the Parks Board up to date on the options being considered and the proposed mitigation for those sections that would be built on parkland at its regular meeting on Tuesday, March 28, 1995. At that time we will have drawings of the various route options and a plan of proposed mitigation for your review. Should the Board wish to make a formal recommendation on any aspect of the project, (such as route, design, or proposed mitigation), this would be an opportune time to do so.

If prior to the meeting on the 28th any member of the Board would like to take a field trip to look at the proposed routes, I am generally available to schedule a trip at your convenience. Please call me at 322-6580 or Regina Thompson at 322-6529 to schedule a time to take a trip.

Thank you for allowing us the time to make a presentation to the Board on this project.

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Status Report on Reconstruction of Transmission Lines Associated with the Holly Power Plant February 1, 1995

In August, 1994 the Austin City Council adopted a resolution that directed the Electric Utility to bring back to all items necessary to implement improvements in the electric transmission system needed to reduce operations at the Holly Street Power Plant. The target date for reduced operations was set as Fall of 1995. Since August, the Electric Utility has explored the various options available to reconstruct the existing transmission lines between the Burleson Substation and Holly and the Seaholm Substation and Holly.

The **Burleson to Holly** line will be reconstructed in place with some minor modifications at its southern end. Most of this line runs along the existing right-of-way of Pleasant Valley Road and can be easily be rebuilt in place.

The majority of the **Holly to Seaholm** line is built along narrow residential streets and would be difficult, if not infeasible to reconstruct in place. Because of the lack of sufficient right-of-way, a reconstructed line would also not be able to utilize the Electric Utility's design to minimize electric and magnetic fields.

As a result of our discussions with residents along the route of the existing line, and discussions and meetings with various groups and City Boards and Commissions, two primary alternative routes have been identified (Please See Attached Map). The Alternative 1 runs along the north shore of Town Lake and eventually connects with the existing line in front of the Four Seasons Hotel.

The Alternative 2 runs along the north boundary of the Town Lake Park area, abutting the south boundary of the Holly neighborhood. This route would connect with the existing line at Rainey Street and follow the existing line to the Seaholm Substation.

The following summarizes the comments of the four Boards and Commissions that we have talked to over the past two weeks.

Parks Board -- The Parks Board did not take any formal action, but was generally opposed to Alternative 1. Of the seven members present, one was in favor of the Alternative 1, five members were opposed to Alternative 1 and preferred Alternative 2 and one member thought that some combination of the two routes might be most appropriate. The Parks Department feels that the route along the lake is unacceptable and felt the route along the north edge of the park could be more easily mitigated.

City of Austin Electric Utility Department

Planning Commission -- The Planning Commission passed a motion (see draft minuets and motion attached) in favor of Alternative 1, and felt that it should be built underground. One member of the commission felt that the additional cost was

Environmental Board -- The Board passed a motion in favor of moving the line as far south as possible (see attached language). The Board also asked the Electric Utility to look at routing the line along Riverside Drive.

Electric Utility Commission -- A presentation was made to the EUC on this item on 1-30. While the commission did not take any formal action, the sense of the commission members present was to move the line out of the neighborhood.

Requested Future Council Action

- 1. To set a Public Hearing under Chapter 26 of the Parks and Wildlife Code to allow the use of parkland for non-parks purposes.
- 2. Approve purchase of necessary easements across private property.

DRAFT MINUTES

HOLLY POWER PLANT:

 Discussion and recommendation on transmission line reconstruction associated with the Holly Power Plant. City Staff: Neal Graham, Electric Utility Department, 322-6580.

Since Commissioner Vasquez-Revilla was not privy to the Resolution that was presented to City Council on this item, she preferred that action be delayed until the next meeting. However, she was willing to hear the report tonight.

Mr. Neal Graham, Electric Utility Department, offered a presentation on the Holly Power Plant. In August, the City Council requested the Electric Utility Department to begin pursuing the reconstruction of transmission lines that will allow the reduced operations of the Holly Power Plant by 1995. The two alternatives are as follows: the first line runs from the Holly Power plant down Holly Street, crossing IH 35, turning north through the Rainey Street neighborhood, and weaves in an area prior to its exit out near the north shore of Town Lake where it runs in front of the Four Seasons Hotel along the north bank of the river to the Seaholm Substation. The second line under reconstruction runs from the Holly Power Plant south along Pleasant Valley Road all the way south into the Burleson Substation that is at the intersection of Burleson Road and Ben White Boulevard; Dales Auto Parts is on the corner. The substation is directly behind it. The construction of these lines is critical to the closure of the first two units at Holly. There will be meetings with the Parks Board to discuss mitigation if either of the routes are to be pursued.

In response to Commissioner Mather's inquiry regarding placement underground on the lake side, Mr. Graham stated that estimated costs for such a project would be between \$9 and \$11 million. He added that there had been the opinion on the part of some members of the Parks Board that the northernmost route would be most appropriate due to the impact on the use of the land as a park.

Commissioner Vasquez-Revilla asked about citizen input; Mr. Graham noted that a representative of the Holly Closure Committee, spoke in favor of the southernmost route and pledged his group's cooperation in the project. Ms. Vasquez-Revilla opined that this testimony is significant because it represents the citizens who live in the neighborhood.

Commissioner Sullivan noted that utility lines have an impact on the quality of life; property values decrease and impact the economic well being of the citizens in the area. He felt that burying lines was a worthy investment. If energy conservation is practiced, rates will not go up significantly.

Commissioner Martinez read a letter from Robert Donley, president of the East Town Lake Neighborhood Association, and co-chair of the Holly Plant

Closure Committee, which stated that it would be in the best interest of the City to place transmission lines away from residences and in a safe path. The message advocated the use of the southernmost plan.

Commissioner Sanders indicated that he could not support investment of such large sums for underground installation, especially in light of increased maintenance costs; he, however, would support the southern route alignment. The citizens of Austin should be apprised of a system-wide cost.

Mr. Graham noted that underground/under water transmission segments could be considered; at present, an analysis of actual maintenance costs has not been done. He noted that lines are being converted over time so that the entire transmission system will be at one voltage which will simplify operation and offer more flexibility and reliability. He reported that salvage costs of the plant have not been researched. The proposed lines will be important in bringing power from Decker and Fayette even after the Holly plant is closed.

SUBJECT: FY 1996 CIP Recommendations

Attached is the proposed 1995-96 Parks and Recreation Department Capital Improvement Project (CIP) Plan and the projects recommended to be included in an upcoming bond election.

All PARD CIP projects are listed in the Capital Improvement Plan pages. Some of these projects are completed, others are either underway or planned for the future. In column 3, marked Proposed 95-96 Bond Sale, you will find the previously approved projects scheduled to receive funding next fiscal year. These include \$335,000 for Colorado River Park Acquisition, \$123,000 for Northwest District Park, \$118,000 for Walnut Creek Metropolitan Park, \$1,598,000 for Accessible Adaptations, \$100,000 for Renovations to Recreation Centers, \$649,000 for Roof Replacements, \$600,000 for Zaragoza Recreation Center, and \$15,690,000 for Barton Creek Wilderness Park. A portion of this bond sale is to satisfy contractual obligations such as reimbursement resolutions for BCWP and Zaragoza Recreation Center.

Each year Boards and Commissions are requested to review the proposed bond sale for the upcoming fiscal year and the need for new projects and make a recommendation to the Planning Commission and City Council. The Planning Commission will be reviewing the Capital Improvement Plan in April. The City Council will review the Plan during the regular budget process. Do you want to hold a public hearing on the Capital Improvement Plan at your April 11th meeting? Please review the attached information and be prepared to discuss your questions and make a recommendation at your next meeting.

If you need additional information on the CIP recommendation or the CIP process, please let me know.

Since 1988, the City has been addressing the oak wilt problem in Austin with the cooperation of the Texas Forest Service and local citizens. As part of our efforts to eliminate oak wilt, the Department is working with Travis County and the Texas Forest Service to photographically document the extent of the problem. Your recommendation to City Council to approve the attached Interlocal Agreement is part of the process to enable taking of aerial photographs. With these photographs, forestry personnel will be able to effectively identify all existing areas of oak wilt within the City limits and on City-owned property outside the City limits. The information derived will aid oak wilt suppression efforts by providing data to use in making accurate suppression plan decisions involving direction of disease spread, rate of spread and distribution within the City.

The Texas Forest Service has the necessary airplane, equipment and expertise to provide the service. The attached Interlocal Agreement delineates the responsibilities of each party in the production, payment and distribution of the photographs.

Your approval is recommended.

INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TEXAS FOREST SERVICE, THE CITY OF AUSTIN, AND TRAVIS COUNTY, TEXAS

THE STATE OF TEXAS S
COUNTY OF TRAVIS

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between the Texas Forest Service (the "Service"), Travis County, Texas, (the "County"), and the City of Austin (the "City"), hereinafter collectively referred to as the "parties", for the purposes and consideration herein described.

WHEREAS, the Service, the City, and the County desire to institute a program to control the spread of oak wilt within the City and County (the "Program"); and

WHEREAS, aerial photography is a useful tool in identifying the areas subject to the spread of oak wilt; and

WHEREAS, the Service is capable of providing such aerial photography services; and

WHEREAS, the Program will mutually benefit the City and the County and serve to protect the public health, safety, welfare, and environment of the residents of both the City and the County; and

WHEREAS, the Service, the City, and the County intend to conform this Agreement with the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Texas Government Code Section 791.001, et seq.;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1) The Service will provide aerial photography services in accordance with the provisions of the Proposal, which is attached hereto and made a part hereof, in order to identify the locations of areas of oak wilt in that portion of the City and County located to the west of Interstate Highway IH-35.
- 2) The City and the County shall each pay the Service for one-third (1/3) of the cost of the performance of the aerial photography services, which are currently projected to cost FOURTEEN THOUSAND TWENTY FIVE AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$14,025.00)

within thirty (30) days of the receipt of an invoice from the Service for such services.

- 3) The Service, the City, and the County shall each designate a representative (the "Representative") to transmit instructions and receive information and otherwise act on behalf of the Service, the City, and the County, respectively, in the performance of the work and the implementation of the Program and every effort shall be made to maintain flexibility in the administration of the Program and this Agreement.
- 4) The Service also agrees to cooperate in providing such information and assistance to the City and the County as necessary to develop the Program.
- 5) To the extent provided by Texas law, the Service, the City, and the County agree that each separate entity is responsible for its own negligent acts and omissions in the activities undertaken pursuant to this Agreement.
- 6) The term of this Agreement shall be for one year and shall thereafter automatically renew year to year, unless either party gives thirty (30) days notice of termination prior to the renewal date.

Proposal for Providing Aerial Photographs for Part of Travis County, Texas

INTRODUCTION

The Texas Forest Service owns and operates a Cessna 207A (Stationair) single engine aircraft that has been modified for taking vertical acrial photographs and videography. A Zeiss RMK A 15/23 large format (9" X 9" photos) aerial camera is mounted in the plane. The camera is coupled to a Zeiss intervalometer to assure proper end-to-end photo overlap. The plane is equipped with a Trimble GPS navigation unit that greatly enhances flight line accuracy. The aircraft is housed in College Station, TX.

The Texas Forest Service was approached in October 1994 by Travis County and the City of Austin to cooperate in funding and providing color infrared, non-stereo, aerial photographs of that portion of Travis County west of IH35. The cost of the project is to be equally divided between these three organizations.

PROCEDURE

Color infrared aerial photographs of a portion of Travis County west of IH35 will be taken at a scale of 1:12,000 (1 inch = 1,000 feet). Twenty-seven flight lines of varying length that are 1.2 miles apart and oriented N-S have been draw on a Travis County map (see attached map). This flight line spacing assures about 30% sidelap between each line. As the plane travels along a flight line, photographs will be taken approximately every 1.4 miles. This will give about 25% endlap between photographs. With 30% sidelap and 25% endlap, complete coverage is provided.

Sun angle plays an important role in the quality of color infrared aerial photographs. Photos should be taken between approximately 1100 hours and 1430 hours CDT to avoid unnecessary shadows on the ground and to assure ample light. Also, cloud shadows on the ground result in marginal to unacceptable photographs, so cloud-free weather is imperative.

At a scale of 1:12,000, each photograph will cover about 1,850 acres (2.9 square miles) and each side of the 9" X 9" photograph will measure 1.7 miles (9,000 ft). The plane will fly approximately 6,000 feet above the average ground elevation.

Kodak aerochrome infrared 2443 film (CIR) will be used. Each roll of film is 200 feet long and 91/2 inches wide and will produce about 225 photographs. A total of about 600 photographs will be taken. The current price for CIR film is around \$5.50 per foot. Film will be purchased by competitive bid following state-approved purchasing guidelines.

Once the CIR film is exposed, it will be sent to a photographic lab for processing. There are relatively few labs in the United States that process CIR film. The film will be processed to a positive transparency and the typical cost is \$1.75 per foot. In addition, an exposure test will be performed for each roll of film at a cost of about \$30 each. A contact print of each positive transparency will be produced at a cost of about \$7.00 per print plus a \$30 color balance charge for each roll of film. The contact prints will be separated such that the City of Austin will receive coverage of Austin and Travis County will receive the remaining prints. The Texas Forest Service will keep the positive transparencies.

The chemicals on CIR film are unstable when exposed to prolonged elevated temperatures. To guard against unnecessary exposure to unsuitable temperatures, the film will be sent to the processing lab by overnight express shipment. Once the film is processed, it should be stable.

There is considerable time involved in planning and administering a photography project of this magnitude. Administrative time is also factored into the project cost

Finally, weather must be factored into the successful completion of this project. It is estimated that about six clear (cloud-free) days will be needed to complete the project. On the average four to seven cloud-free days can be expected to occur in April in Central Texas. It may be difficult to predict when these days will occur. A certain amount of lead time is needed (to coordinate personnel, thaw film, load the camera magazine, and physically fly to the Austin area) in order to take photographs. Forecasting weather is far from an exact science, so it is likely that some clear days will occur that were not forecast and no photographs will be taken. On the other hand, some forecasts that predict clear days, may have enough unexpected cloud formation to prohibit photography. If a forecast calls for clear weather and the plane flies to Austin, unexpected clouds could develop making usable photography impossible and the plane and crew would have to return to College Station without taking any photos. Although every effort is taken to avoid this situation, it could happen. Keep in mind that cost estimates have been figured somewhat liberally so that some unexpected costs can be absorbed. When final actual project costs are figured, they USUALLY are below the estimated costs.

DATE: March 9, 1995

The contract for the Miniature Train Concession in Zilker Park expired on April 30, 1994. Following two public hearings a Request for Proposals (RFP) was issued on March 14, 1994. The evaluation team which reviewed the responses recommended that this solicitation be canceled and a new one be issued limiting proposals to the current 16" gauge track. A new RFP was issued on September 12, 1994. On February 2, 1995 Council passed a resolution directing Parks and Recreation Department staff to issue a new RFP with special emphasis on converting the train to an alternative fuel source, establishing a second terminal and extending the track to the parking lot under the south side of Loop 1, and train cars that are more easily accessible. As a result, the RFP issued in September has also been canceled.

In an effort to ensure that the train continues to operate and serve the park users until a new contract is awarded, the Parks and Recreation Department will be requesting that the City Council extend the contract with to the current concessionaire, Zilker Eagle Inc. from April 1, 1995 through September 30, 1996.

The current contractor is requesting a fee increase at this time. The fees for this concession have not been raised since 1986. The concessionaire needs this revenue generated by an increase to offset the income lost when the train was shut down from September 7, 1994 to November 19, 1994 to remove contaminated soil from one of the tunnels. The Parks Department supports this increase.

In conjunction with the contract extension, standard hours of operation and business management practices will be incorporated into the contract. Minimum hours of operation, weather permitting, will be:

Summer (June 1 - August 31)
Tuesday - Sunday 10:00 am - 6:00 p.m.
Closed Mondays for maintenance

Off Season (September - May) Weekends only 12:00 - 5:00 p.m.

The proposed contract extension is for seventeen (17) months with no extension options. The estimated revenue to the City of Austin is \$44,000 over the duration of the extension. Estimated revenue is based on 10% of gross sales revenue, less sales tax, with no minimum guarantee.

The concessionaire has agreed to conduct a complete upgrade to the aesthetics and passenger comfort features of the trains by the end of September 1995, provided the proposed rate increase is approved. The equipment upgrade would include removing and repainting the trains and providing new, more comfortable seating for the passenger cars.

RECOMMENDATION:

I recommend that the Parks Board approve the extension of this contract and the increased fees as listed above.

Dear Mr. Heitz:

This law firm represents Robert J. Barrus and Thunhi Barrus. If you recall, by my letter of January 18, 1995, a copy of which I have enclosed for your convenience, I requested approval for construction of a boat dock on the Barruses lot. I was subsequently advised by Peter Marsh of the Parks and Recreation Department that the Navigation Committee had informally decided against recommending approval of my clients' request to the Parks and Recreation Board and instead proposed that a restrictive covenant be imposed upon the adjoining lot, after which it would look favorably upon my clients' request.

I discussed the proposal of a restrictive covenant with the owner of the adjoining lot, Mr. Alvin Muilenburg, who indicated that he would be agreeable to such an idea pending a review of the document itself. I thereupon prepared the restrictive covenant, secured the informal approval of the Parks and Recreation Department as to its form and content, and sent it to Mr. Muilenburg for his approval and execution. A copy of my letter of March 6th and the covenant are enclosed for your convenience. Unfortunately, Mr. Muilenburg has now declined our request. A copy of his telefax to me to that effect is enclosed.

Based on the foregoing, I again request approval of the construction of a boat dock on the Barruses' lot. Their situation presents a compelling case for a variance as set forth in §13–2–834 of the Austin Land Development Code, in that:

- (1) 'The provisions of [Chapter 13-2] applicable to the property do not allow for a reasonable use;
- (2) The hardship for which the variance is granted is unique to the property and not general to the area in which the property is located; and
- (3) The variance will not alter the character of the area adjacent to the property, will not impair the use of adjacent conforming property, and will not impair the purposes or regulations to the district in which the property is located.

Please place this request on the agenda of your March 28th meeting. I will attend the meeting in order to answer any questions you may have about this request. Thank you for your assistance.
