CURRENT POLITICAL CLIMATE

- Anti-city environment (preempt cities roles and limit property taxes)
- Governor and Lt. Governor committed to property tax issue
- Driven by organized opposition to local governments
- Republican lead legislature that's not changing
- Speaker's race extremely important to cities



CURRENT POLITICAL CLIMATE

"...on the topic of **reining in local government**, I am calling for legislation that **reduces, restricts and prohibits local regulations**."

- Gov. Greg Abbott, June 6, 2017 in press conference calling a special session of the legislature

"As opposed to the state having to take multiple rifle-shot approaches at overriding local regulations, I think a **broad-based law** by the state of Texas that says across the board, the state is going to **pre-empt local regulations**, is a superior approach... makes it more simple, more elegant,"
