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2016 MOBILITY BOND



\$720 million for transportation and mobility improvements

- \$101 million for Regional Mobility Projects
- \$482 million for Corridor Improvement Projects
- \$137 million for Local Mobility Projects
 - Sidewalks \$37.5 million
 - Urban Trails \$26 million
 - Safe Routes to School \$27.5 million divided evenly by 10 City Council Districts
 - Bikeways \$20 million
 - Intersection Safety/Vision Zero \$15 million
 - Sub-Standard Streets/Capital Renewal \$11 million

2016 BOND: ACCELERATED DELIVERY



- Executive level support and focus
- Robust coordination among programs
- Accelerated processes to meet 8-year goal
- Resources put to key areas of complexity, need
 - Corridor Program Office, other resources
- Keep community stakeholders engaged and informed
- Mitigate impacts on businesses and neighborhoods
- Keep outcomes in focus: mobility, community outcomes

2016 BOND: IMPLEMENTATION PROGRESS




- 2016 Mobility Bond Program is on time and on budget
 - Contract With Voters
 - Rapidly launched into program implementation following voter approval
 - February 2017: First funding appropriation for early-out activities
- Enhanced coordination between programs
 - Over 400 projects identified in the 2018 Local Mobility Annual Plan
 - 2019 Mobility Annual Plan underway
- Development and implementation of MBE/WBE Outreach Plan
- Solicitations and Contracts to date
 - 19 solicitations issued resulting in execution of 33 Professional Service Agreements and 10 Construction Contracts with a value of \$149,750,977
 - 27 companies have been awarded contracts of which 5 companies are MBE/WBE certified

2016 BOND: TERMINOLOGY REFRESHER




- <u>Budget</u> is the authority to spend funds and is commonly referred to as Appropriation in the financial system
 - Design and Construction Contracts put in place
 - To be spent over multiple years; money needed at time of contract execution
- <u>Spend Plan</u> reflects estimated cash flow for capital projects and corresponds to the project schedule
 - These are estimates for planning purposes
 - Confidence level highest for the year ahead and decreases in the later years of planning horizon.
- Spent refers to expenses/actual costs paid by the City
 - Lag between improvements on the ground and money out the door



- Anderson Mill Road: (\$5.5M) 60% design








\$101 million for Regional Mobility Projects

- Loop 360 Intersection Improvements: (\$46M) Advanced Funding Agreement with TxDOT June 2017
- RM 620 at RM 2222: (\$7.5M) Advanced Funding Agreements with TxDOT Aug. 2017; Project 1 construction started Nov. 2018
- Parmer Lane/FM 734: (\$17M) Advanced Funding Agreements with TxDOT June 2017, in schematic & environmental phase
- Old Bee Caves Rd Bridge: Old Bee Caves Road Bridge, included in Oak Hill Parkway build alternative, anticipated \$3.3M local participation for ROW/utilities





- Initiated or completed 7
 PERs/Corridor Mobility Plans
- Corridor Construction Program adopted by City Council – April 2018
- Preliminary Engineering for Corridor Construction Program in progress
- First round public open houses for 7 Corridor Construction Program corridors completed













LOCAL MOBILITY: SIDEWALKS



Sidewalks - \$37.5 million

- Coordination with other City programs and partner agencies
- \$11M+ spent on 2016 Local Mobility Sidewalk projects
- 50+ sidewalk projects completed todate
- Expects to implement more than 80 projects in FY 19

LOCAL MOBILITY: URBAN TRAILS



Urban Trails - \$26 million

- Secured \$5.3M in CAMPO grant funding, and an additional \$1.2M from Travis County in FY 18
- Completed 4 trail connectors
 - Balcones Park Walnut Creek Trail Connection
 - 51st St Mueller Trail Segment
 - Boggy Creek Trail Connection to Webberville
 - Country Club Creek Low Water Trail Crossing
- 3 Preliminary Engineering Reports
- 4 project designs

LOCAL MOBILITY: SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL



Safe Routes to School - \$27.5 million

- Walk Audits at 101 elementary and middle schools
- 17 projects moved forward to construction, 14 are complete
- District reports for Council Districts 1 and 10 to be completed this fall
- Reports for Council Districts 2, 8 and 9 to be completed early spring





LOCAL MOBILITY: SUBSTANDARD STREETS/ CAPITAL RENEWAL



Substandard Streets/Capital Renewal - \$11 million Capital Renewal:

- Fallwell Lane
 - Began preliminary engineering phase Oct. 2017
 - Recently completed months of stakeholder input
 - Final Preliminary Engineering Report Aug. 2018
- William Cannon Bridge Extension over Union Pacific Railroad
 - Preliminary Engineering Report completed Aug. 2018

Bikeways - \$20 million

- 12 projects in implementation phase
- 38 additional projects in active development

LOCAL MOBILITY: INTERSECTION SAFETY/ VISION ZERO



Intersection Safety/Vision Zero - \$15 million

- 3 projects completed:
 - Pleasant Valley/Elmont
 - Congress/Oltorf
 - 45th/Red River
- Started construction of 5 projects
- Key planning/coordination:
 - 8 out of 15 projects currently active
 - Coordinated safety analyses with Corridor Mobility Program for 11 overlapping intersections







