# HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION JANUARY 28, 2019 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2019-0009 4404 ROSEDALE AVENUE

#### **PROPOSAL**

Demolish a ca. 1935 house.

#### ARCHITECTURE

One-story, L-plan cross-gabled brick-veneered house with minimal Tudor Revival detailing; single and paired 6:6 fenestration; front gablet over principal entry.

### RESEARCH

The house was built in 1935; the first occupants were renters, Vaile and Rose M. Henry, who lived here until around 1939. Vaile Henry was an accountant for the Railroad Commission of Texas. In the early 1940s, the house was rented then owned by Alvin A. Minnie L. Fleischer. Alvin A. Fleischer was an electrician. Chester and Myra Cawlfield rented the house from the late 1940s through the early 1950s. Chester Cawlfield was a clerk of the Post Office; Myra Cawlfield was an accountant in the auditor's office at the University of Texas. Since the tenancy of the Cawlfields, the house has had a series of short-term renters.

### STAFF COMMENTS

The house is beyond the bounds of any City survey to date.

Staff has evaluated this house for designation as a historic landmark and has determined that the house does not meet the criteria for landmark designation as set forth in City Code, but would be contributing to a potential historic district in the Rosedale neighborhood:

- a. **Architecture.** The house has minimal Tudor Revival detailing in its configuration and overall massing, but otherwise little architectural distinction; it does, however, appear to be remarkably intact.
- b. **Historical association**. The house has principally served as a rental property for middle-class families, none of whom appear to have significant historical associations.
- c. **Archaeology**. The house was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
- d. **Community value**. The house does not possess a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group.
- e. **Landscape feature**. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, including consideration of a postponement to fully evaluate alternatives to demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. The house does not meet the criteria for individual designation as a historic landmark, but would be contributing to a potential historic district in the Rosedale neighborhood.

### **BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:**

### Vaile and Rose M. Henry (ca. 1936 - ca. 1939)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Vaile and Rose M. Henry as the renters of the house at 1609 Enfield Road. Vaile Henry was 30, had been born in Missouri, and was an accountant for the State Railroad Commission. Rose M. Henry was 23, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had no children listed with them. They lived in Electra, Wichita County, Texas in 1935.

NOTE: Vaile and Rose M. Henry are not listed in the directory.

Walton Vaile Henry died in Tulsa, Oklahoma in 1977 and is buried there. Rose M. Henry died in Los Angeles, California in 1999.

### Alvin A. and Minnie L. Fleischer (ca. 1942 – ca. 1948)

Alvin A. and Minnie Lee Fleischer are listed in the 1940 U.S. Census for Round Rock, Texas, where they rented their home. Alvin A. Fleischer was 29, had been born in Texas, and was a salesman at a gasoline station. He lived in rural Travis County in 1935. Minnie Lee Fleischer was 33, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. She lived in Pflugerville, Texas in 1935. They had a son, Donald A. Fleisher, 2, who had been born in Texas.

Alvin August Fleischer died in 1973. His death certificate shows that he was living on a Round Rock rural route at the time of his death. He was born in Texas in 1910 and was an electrician.

### Chester and Myra Cawlfield (ca. 1948 - ca. 1955)

Chester and Myra Cawlfield appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owners of a house on Tillery Street in East Austin; that house was worth \$3,000. Chester Cawlfield was 28, had been born in Texas, and was a painter in building construction. Myra Cawlfield was 29, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had no children listed with them.

Myra Nolen Cawlfield died in 1963, while living at 6204 Woodview Avenue. She was born in 1911 in Austin and was an accountant. Chester Worthing Cawlfield died in 1977; he was living at 6204 Woodview Avenue at the time of his death. He was born in Stockdale, Texas in 1911 and was a clerk with the postal service.

MRS. MYRA N. CAWLFIELD

Mrs. Myra Nolen Cawlfield, 6240 Woodview, died in a local hospital Monday. She was an accountant in the auditor's office at the University of Texas and a member of the Methodist Church.

She is survived by her husband, C. Q. Cawlfield; two sons, James S. Cawlfield and William J. Cawlfield; her mother, Mrs. J. Ida Nolen; a sister, Miss Ada Nolen and one brother, John Warren Nolen, all of Austin.

Funeral services will be held. Wednesday at 3 p.m. at the Cook Funeral Home with Rev. John Deschner officiating. Burial will be in the Masonic Cemetery.


