HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION MAY 20, 2019 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2019-0200 415 EAST 30TH STREET

PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1892 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, L-plan, cross-gabled Folk Victorian building with replacement asbestos siding; scalloped wood shingles at gable end; 1:1 replacement windows with wood screens; modified partial-width shed porch with cinderblock railing; composition shingle roof.

RESEARCH

The house at 415 East 30th Street was built around 1892 by English immigrant William J. Warren, a local grocer who sold produce on Lavaca Street and Congress Avenue with his sons from at least 1887 to his death in the late 1890s. Sidney G. Warren, his middle son, also lived in the house and worked at Bosche's laundry on Congress Avenue with other members of the Warren family. Newspaper records indicate that Sidney G. Warren owned multiple commercial lots in Austin, some of which he sold or leased to laundry operators around town. After William Warren's death between 1893 and 1895, the house was left to his son John, who worked as a clerk at his brother Frederick's grocery and, later, a driver at Bosche's laundry. John A. Warren and his wife Florence lived in the house for at least 14 years.

By 1909, the house had been sold by the Warren family and was occupied by a series of renters and short-term owners for most of its history. Notable residents include Hugo Brueggeman, a concrete contractor, who installed many of Austin's earliest sidewalks with his father and brother at the time of his residence in the house in 1916. The Brueggeman family home at 107 W 30th Street is a city landmark and Recorded Texas Historic Landmark. Austin businessman C.A.A. Bloebaum and his family briefly occupied the house in the 1930s, and the Mobley family, proprietors of the San Jacinto Barbershop, lived there between 1949 and 1952. Throughout the 1960s and '70s, it was home to several University of Texas students and research associates.

STAFF COMMENTS

The building was listed in the Comprehensive Cultural Resources Survey (1984), but was not assigned a priority rating for research.


Designation Criteria—Historic Landmark

- 1) The building is more than 50 years old.
- 2) The building appears to retain a low degree of integrity.
- 3) Properties must meet two historic designation criteria for landmark designation (City of Austin Land Development Code, Section 25-2-352).
- a. *Architecture*. While the building clearly began as a Folk Victorian modified L-plan house, its exterior materials, windows, and original porch have been removed and/or replaced. The existing house does not retain sufficient integrity to exemplify its style and type.
- b. *Historical association*. The home's longest and oldest association is with the Warren family. Though the Warrens' business ventures were relatively far-reaching for the

- time, there is limited information on their impact as business owners to Austin as a whole. While other residents also had potential contributions to Austin's history, their tenancies were not long enough to constitute significant historical associations.
- c. *Archaeology*. The property was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
- d. *Community value*. The property does not appear to have a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, a neighborhood, or a particular group.
- e. *Landscape feature*. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, then relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center; additionally, encourage reuse of any salvageable historic materials from both the interior and exterior of the house. Though the house is distinguished by its age, it does not retain sufficient integrity to meet the standard for designation as an individual landmark.

Judge Calhonn Vacates Order for Appointment of Junkin in Laundry Litigation.

Andge George Calhoun of the Fiftythird District Court yesterday vacated his order, made hat week, for the appointment of a receiver for the Troy and Model laundries.

Under that order Edward D. Junkin was made receiver, in pursuance of a stipulation in the deed of trust executed when the properties were transferred by Philip Bosche to Sidney D. Warren, who in turn leased the Model laundry recently to O. M. Dayls et al.

Lengthy arguments were made in the morning, following the conclusion of the testimony of Mr. Bosche, which was begun Saturday.

The defendant — Mr. Bosche — will have the privilege of Instituting new proceedings in the case should events create the necessity, and there were intimations in the arguments of Judge Brady for the plaintiffs in the application for the discharge of the receiver, that damage suits may result from the proceedings.




