

1980s

- Creation of the block grant
- Federal \$\$ pass through to States to CAAs
 - Texas uses a formula based on poverty population and poverty density
 - 90% of funds allocated go to the 40 CAAs
 - 5% disasters/discret ionary
 - 5% state admin
- Mission and purpose remain the same

1981

Federal CSBG Act



Requires a Tri-Partite Board with, at least, 1/3 of representatives democratically-selected from low-income communities.

1990s

Six National Goals

Goal 1. Low-income people become more self-sufficient. (Family)

Goal 2. The conditions in which low-income people live are improved. **(Community)**

Goal 3. Low-income people own a stake in their community. (Community)

Goal 4. Partnerships among supporters and providers of services to low-income people are achieved. **(Agency)**

Goal 5. Agencies increase their capacity to achieve results. **(Agency)**

Goal 6. Low-income people, especially vulnerable populations, achieve their potential by strengthening family and other supportive systems. **(Family)**

Individuals and families with low incomes are stable and achieve economic security.

Communities where people with low incomes live are healthy and offer economic opportunity.

People with low incomes are engaged and active in building opportunities in communities.



- Maximize involvement of people with low incomes

- Advocate for systemic change

Demographics

- 1,691 unduplicated persons received direct funded CSBG services.
- 37,183 unduplicated persons received CSBG supported services (no additional demographics gathered).

Successes

- > 466 persons avoided eviction.
 - Exceeded our goal of 375 persons (124.27% of goal)
- 15 unemployed adults obtained employment with a living wage or higher.
 - Exceeded our goal of 10 persons (150% of goal)
- > 43 persons transitioned out of poverty
 - Met our goal of 43 persons (100% of goal)

Successes (cont.)

- > 30,403 persons received food assistance
- > 353 persons received rent assistance
- 775 Flu Shots provided by Public Health Nurses at the Neighborhood Center
- 7,073 persons served received Public Health Nursing services at the Neighborhood Centers


Successes (cont.)

- > 669 persons received tax preparation services.
 - Partnership with the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP)

Areas for Improvement

- Sharpen focus on outreach to low-income individuals and families
- Continue to explore options for service expansion to underserved areas
- Continue to strengthen partnerships that help remove barriers to self-sufficiency
