East Austin Neighborhood Center


- One of six Neighborhood Centers that provide basic need services to individuals and families in the Austin and Travis County area.






OCTOBER 2018 - JULY 2019 CSBG Services

- Number of Individuals that:
- Transitioned out of Poverty: 8 (goal is 9)
- Employed and increased wage/salary: 18
- Received transportation assistance: 18
- Avoided eviction: 11
- Received Rent Assistance: 16

Program Year to date Result Highlights (Continued)

- Number of Individuals that:
- Received Food assistance: 6,445
- Received baby clothing assistance: 1,701
- Public Health Nurse Services: 381

Case Management/Self Sufficiency Success Story

- Unemployed 35 year old single mother of 2 (ages 3 & 9). Received assistance with:
 - Rent
 - Obtaining childcare
 - employment support
 - financial coaching
 - supportive counseling
 - transportation and food assistance

Success Story (Continued)

- Obtained full-time stable employment with the state;
- Was recalled to her temporary/seasonal job;
- Went back to finish her associate degree in accounting;
- Transitioned out of poverty with stable employment, housing, and a plan for career advancement.
