- One of six Neighborhood Centers that provide basic need services to individuals and families in the Austin and Travis County area.
- All services provided are free of charge.

St. John Community Center

- Some services require financial eligibility screening.
- Center hours: Monday-Thursday 8:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m.
 Fridays 8:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.

What's Unique about SJCC

- Co-located with Pickle ES AISD building
- Northernmost COA Neighborhood Center
- Higher population of Refugees / Asylees
- Higher population of people speaking languages other than English and Spanish – Vietnamese, Arabic, Farsi, Burmese, and Urdu most common

Basic Needs Services

- Food distributions
 - Fresh Foods for Families
 - Partnership for food recovery with Wheatsville
 - Healthy Options Program for the Elderly (HOPE)
 - Food pantry

Basic Needs (cont.)

- Rent and Utility assistance
- Bus passes

- Information and Referral

Case Management

- Self Sufficiency Case management focused on assisting people to transition out of poverty - budgeting, job search assistance, job coaching, training and education programs
- Related supports Connections to affordable housing, child care, child support
- 31-day bus passes
- Short-term counseling Quality of life



Client Impact – Basic Needs

- > 307 unduplicated people received direct funded CSBG services. (January-September 2019)
- > 105 people avoided eviction (Jan-Sep)
- **53** people kept utilities on or were restored (Jan-Sep)
- > 6900 unduplicated people received CSBG supported services primarily through mass distributions. (Oct.-Sept.)

Client Impact - Employment

January – September 2019

- 12 individuals Transitioned Out of Poverty
- **30** clients got jobs
- 19 clients increased income
- 5 clients got jobs with benefits

Client Impact - Health

October – August

- 950 people served by the SJCC nurse
- **35** people received diabetes case management
- 51 people connected to health insurance
- 122 people given flu shots

Success Story

Married veteran with 4 children, living in hotel, unemployed, uncontrolled diabetes

- Started working with SJCC nurse
- Worked with SJCC social worker
- > Used resources provided by RN, SW, and other agencies
- Received VASH voucher and found affordable housing
- Started salaried job with a state agency
- Household of 6 Transitioned Out of Poverty
