

#### Client Impact – Basic Needs

- ➤ 1084 direct funded CSBG services in the form of rent, bus passes and gift cards were provided. (October 2018-September 2019)
- 120 people avoided eviction (Oct-Sept.)
- 29 people kept utilities on or were restored (Oct-Sept.)
- 8534 unduplicated people received CSBG supported services primarily through mass distributions. (Oct.-Sept.)

#### **Client Impact - Employment**

#### October 2018 – September 2019

- 15 individuals Transitioned Out of Poverty
- 14 clients got jobs
- 12 clients increased income

#### Client Impact - Health

#### October – September

- 736 people served by the SANC nurse
- 25 people received diabetes case management
- 29 people connected to health insurance
- 51 people given flu shots

## Client Impact- Dove Springs Outreach basic needs

- 2,439 persons received food services for the first time October- Sept.2019
- 12,589 persons received food services several times October- Sept.2019.

#### **Success Story**

Single female who was raised as a foster child. She became homeless due to mental health diagnosis and barriers associated with the diagnosis. She was living in the woods adjacent to the South Austin Neighborhood Center and worked odd jobs.

- Started working with SANC social worker.
- Used resources provided by SW to acquire mental health services and activate the coordinated assessment.
- Connected with ECHO and found affordable housing.
- Started fulltime food service job.
- Transitioned Out of Poverty.
