Dear Steve,

I received notice of the demolition permit for 3303 Southill Circle. (This is the third demolition on our street - which only has 15 homes/lots). (The original owners at 3405 Southill Circle were the August Wittenborn family. Dr. Wittenborn was a UT graduate, a physicist, and President of Tracor, a local tech firm - one of Austin's first "high tech" companies).

I am not complaining about the permit, but I would very much like to be assured that the Historic Landmark Commission and the City of Austin records acknowledge the persons who have lived in the house, and their contributions to the City of Austin, the State of Texas and beyond.

The Property information on TCAD only goes back three deed records... but I believe that it establishes that **John C.**White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture 1950 - 1977, lived at 3303 Southill Circle -- at least from the time it was built until 1970. John C. White was called to Washington in 1977 by President Jimmy Carter to serve as Deputy Secretary of Agriculture...

The information about John C. White in the Handbook of Texas Online is guite extensive....

It appears that after his divorce from his first wife in 1970, the title to 3303 Southill Circle was transferred from Mary Jean White, John White's first wife, to Jack Balagia. The Balagia family lived there until very recently. Jack Balagia was a veteran of WW II, and had an extensive resume per his obituary. HIs wife, Sophie Balagia, died just a few months ago, and was also a contributor to this community.

I don't know that much about what will be presented to the Historic Landmark Commission about 3303 Southill Circle, but I do hope that some information about the owners of the house can be presented and preserved in the records, as

both John C. White, and Jack Balagia and his family, have served this community and beyond, in ways that we should remember and honor.
