HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION DECEMBER 16, 2019 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2019-0575 4507 FINLEY DRIVE

PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1953 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story frame Ranchette clad in horizontal wood siding with masonry accents, side-gabled roof clad in composition shingles, multi-light picture window and single 6-light casement windows, partial-width porch, and built-in carport at main elevation.

RESEARCH

The house was constructed in 1953 by builder Walter Carrington. Its first owner-occupants were Marvin E. and Alief H. Lewis, who lived in the house until at least 1977. Marvin Lewis worked at the Texas State Highway Commission until at least 1968, first as a special equipment operator and then as a construction supervisor. Alief Halton Lewis's mother, Mrs. John C. Halton, lived with the Lewis family in their home for a year until her death. Alief H. Lewis and her mother were descendants of Stephen F. Austin's first colony in Texas.

By 1981, the house was vacant; it was occupied during the remainder of the '80s and '90s by short-term owners.

STAFF COMMENTS

Designation Criteria—Historic Landmark

- 1) The building is more than 50 years old.
- 2) The building appears to retain high to moderate integrity.

3) Properties must meet two historic designation criteria for landmark designation (LDC, §25-2-352).

- a) Architecture. The house is constructed in the Ranchette/Transitional Ranch style.
- b) *Historical association*. The house does not appear to meet the criterion for significant historical association, as it does not have long-standing significant associations with persons, groups, institutions, businesses, or events of historic importance; the Commission may consider its residents as examples of middle-class residents of Austin.
- c) *Archaeology*. The house was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
- d) *Community value*. The house does not possess a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group.
- e) *Landscape feature*. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, then relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center.


