2013 BOND, PROPOSITION 1 Affordable Housing



The issuance of \$65,000,000 affordable housing bonds and notes for constructing, renovating, improving, and equipping affordable housing for low- income persons and families; acquiring land and interests in land and property necessary to do so; and funding affordable housing programs as may be permitted by law; and the levy of a tax sufficient to pay for the bonds and notes.

2018 BOND, PROPOSITION A Affordable Housing



The issuance of \$250,000,000 in tax supported general obligation bonds and notes for planning, constructing, renovating, improving, and equipping affordable housing facilities for low income and moderate income persons and families, and acquiring land and interests in land and property necessary to do so, funding loans and grants for affordable housing, and funding affordable housing programs, as may be permitted by law; and the levy of a tax sufficient to pay for the bonds and notes.

• Time Line: 8 years










2013 BOND, PROPOSITION 1 – Affordable Housing SPENDING SUMMARY - \$ Amount Available After Annual Spending



City of Austin Affordable Rental Housing

This map shows existing City-funded or incentivized affordable rentals in relation to the proposed transit expansion. These investments were made by the City through several funding streams. Some are made possible through past community approved bond dollars like the 2018, 2013, and 2006 General Obligation Bonds. Others are made possible through affordable housing development incentive programs like the University Neighborhood Overlay (UNO) density bonus program or the Mueller development.

These affordable rentals are income-restricted and available to qualifying residents. Eligibility for affordable housing starts at generally making 60% or less of AMI, or Austin Area Median Income. For a family of four that translates to a maximum annual family income of \$58,560 in 2020.

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







What You'll Find in the Plan


Recommendation Letter: Outlining capital improvement priorities, the letter is from the Planning Commission to the City Manager as part of the Commission's annual requirements per City Charter.


Comprehensive Infrastructure Assessment: Collects citywide infrastructure condition information to help inform future infrastructure needs and future funding opportunities.

Strategic Investment Areas Overlay Analysis: Geographical mapping and analysis of the intersection of City initiatives and capital needs identified by the public and the City.

Rolling Needs Assessment: Bi-Annually updated list of long-term and unfunded citywide CIP needs, organized by infrastructure category.
