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2006 BOND, PROPOSITION 7 Public Safety

City of Austin



Bond Election

The issuance of \$58,100,000 in tax supported General Obligation Bonds and Notes for constructing, renovating, improving, and equipping public safety facilities, including, without limitation, a public safety training facility, police stations, emergency medical services buildings and facilities, a municipal courthouse, an animal shelter, and other related facilities and acquiring land and interests in land and property necessary to do so; and the levy of a tax sufficient to pay for the bonds and notes.

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2012 BOND, PROPOSITION 16 Public Safety



The issuance of \$31,079,000 public safety facility improvement bonds and notes and the levy of a tax sufficient to pay for the bonds and notes. This proposition allows the City to provide funding for designing, constructing, improving and equipping police, fire and emergency medical services facilities. Facility projects could include renovations, expansions and new public safety facilities.

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2018 BOND, PROPOSITION F Public Safety



The issuance of \$38,000,000 in tax supported general obligation bonds and notes for planning, renovating, improving, and equipping existing public safety facilities, specifically fire and emergency medical services stations, buildings, and other related facilities; and the levy of a tax sufficient to pay for the bonds and notes.

- Emergency Medical Services Renovations: \$25 million
- Fire Station Renovations: \$13 million
- **Time Line** (as defined in *Contract with the Voters*): **8 years**

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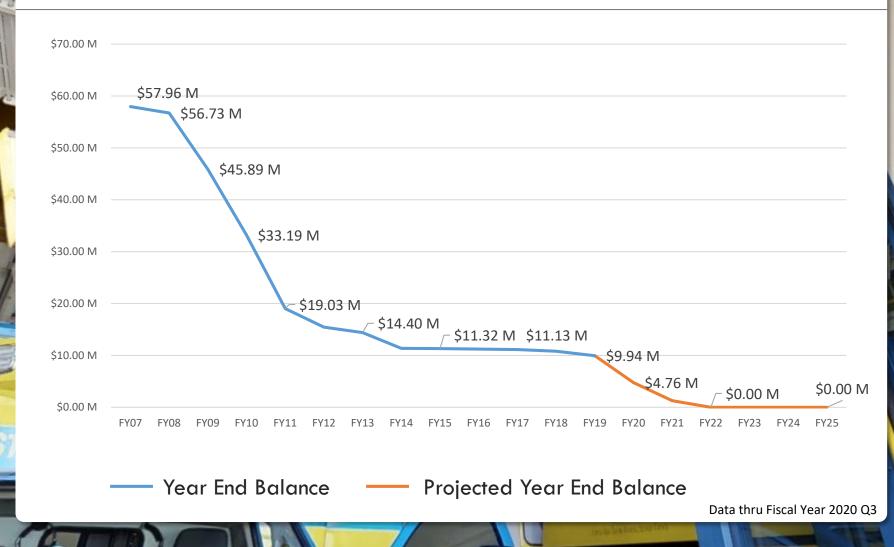
Data thru Fiscal Year 2020 Q3

*Approval of each bond proposition gives the City the authority to sell bonds and spend funds up to the amount approved by voters. However, general obligation bonds must be sold in \$5,000 increments, necessitating the City to allocate Prop 17 funds in an amount \$3,000 less than voters approved.

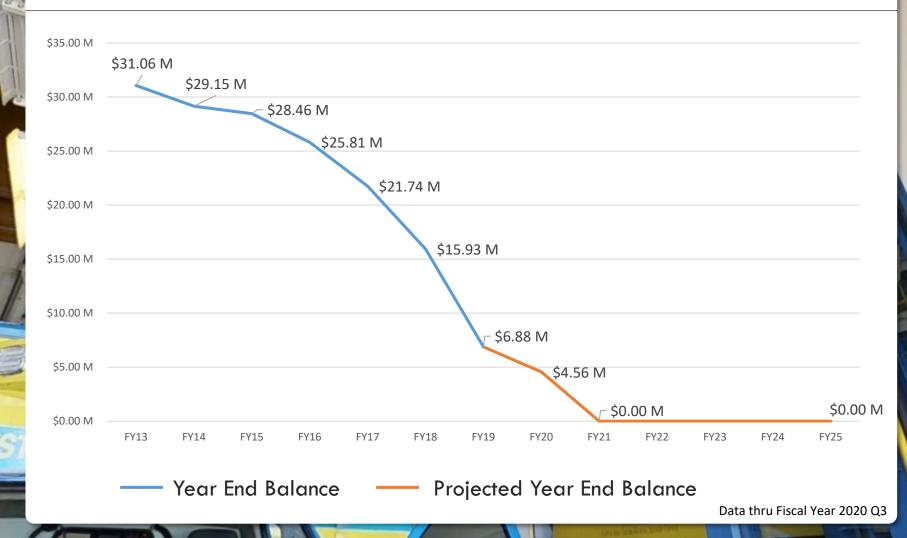
SPENDING SUMMARY - \$ Amount Available After Annual Spending

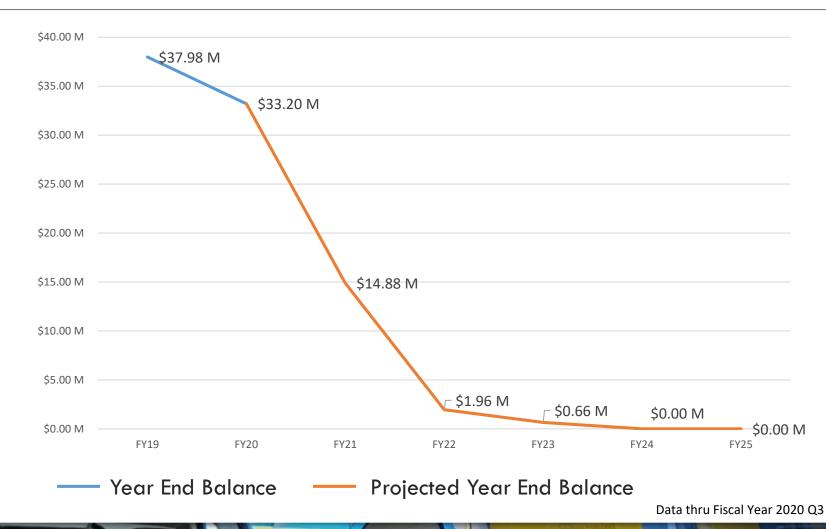
SPENDING SUMMARY - \$ Amount Available After Annual Spending

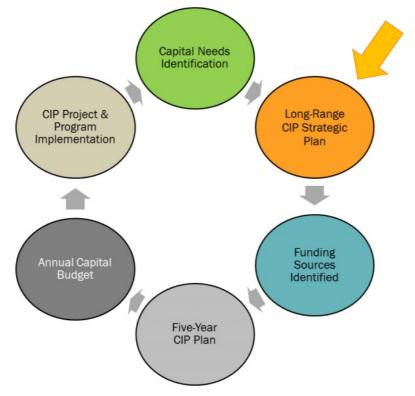
Comprehensive Infrastructure Assessment: Collects citywide infrastructure condition information to help inform future infrastructure needs and future funding opportunities.

Strategic Investment Areas Overlay Analysis: Geographical mapping and analysis of the intersection of City initiatives and capital needs identified by the public and the City.

Rolling Needs Assessment: Bi-Annually updated list of long-term and unfunded citywide CIP needs, organized by infrastructure category.

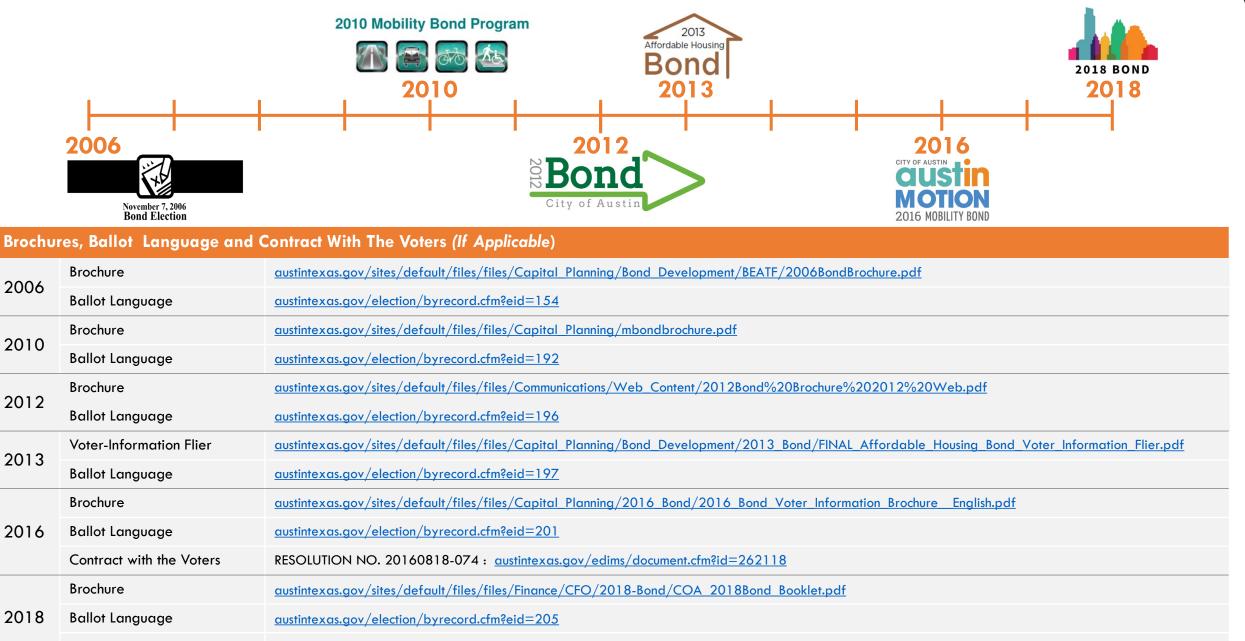
