# Reapportionment and Redistricting City of Austin, TX

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## Rationale for Reapportionment and Redistricting

Constitutional and Voting Rights Requirements

Reapportionment every ten years

Based on Census Reports

#### Reapportionment

Every ten years, immediately after census, must determine the amount of population growth or loss in each city council district.

All districts must be within a +/- 10% deviation from the most to least populated district to insure one-person/one-vote constitutional requirement.

#### **Census Data**

Basis of population numbers.

Total city population/number of districts = population per district.

There cannot be more than a 10% population deviation from the largest to the smallest district.
