April 4, 1966

The meeting was called to order with Mayor Palmer presiding.

MAYOR PALMER announced this was a Special Meeting of the City Council called for the purpose to canvass the election returns of the Bond Election held on April 2, 1966.

Councilman Long commended the Administration for its fine work in selling the bond issue to the people, in going to special meetings all over the City, and working long hours overtime.

Councilman LaRue expressed pleasure in living in a community where it could pay for a \$50,000,000 Utility Bond issue without an increase in taxes or an increase in rates. He stated this was contributed to good management and he hoped it continues.

RESOLUTION CANVASSING RETURNS AND  
DECLARING RESULT OF ELECTION

ON THIS the 4th day of April, 1966, the City Council of the City of Austin, Texas, convened in special session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

constituting a quorum; at which time the following among other business was transacted:

Mayor Palmer introduced a resolution canvassing returns and declaring result of an election held in the City of Austin on the 2nd day of April, 1966.

The resolution was read. Whereupon, it was moved by Councilman Long and seconded by Councilman Shanks that the resolution be finally passed and adopted, and said motion carried by the following vote:

AYES: Mayor Palmer and Councilmen LaRue, Shanks, White and  
Councilwoman Long.

NOES: None

The Mayor then announced that the resolution had been finally passed and adopted.

The RESOLUTION is as follows:

"A RESOLUTION by the City Council of the City of Austin, Texas, canvassing returns and declaring results of a bond election held in said City on the 2nd day of April, 1966, to authorize the issuance of bonds of the City of Austin; enacting provisions incident and relating to the purpose and object of this resolution and declaring an emergency."

WHEREAS, under and by virtue of an ordinance duly passed by the City Council of the City of Austin, Texas, on the 10th day of March, 1966, an election was held in said City on the 2nd day of April, 1966, on three propositions for the issuance of the bonds of said City of Austin, Texas, in the following amounts and for the following purposes, to-wit:

\$34,200,000 revenue bonds for the purpose of extending and improving the City's Electric Light and Power System;

\$ 8,100,000 revenue bonds for the purpose of extending and improving the City's Waterworks System; and

\$ 7,700,000 revenue bonds for the purpose of extending and improving the City's Sewer System;

AND WHEREAS, on this the 4th day of April, 1966, there came on to be considered the returns of said election; and

WHEREAS, upon consideration of the returns of said election, it appears that the same was in all respects legally held, after due notice had been given, and that the said returns were duly and legally made; and

WHEREAS, it further appears from said returns that there were cast at said election 10,681 votes on the proposition for the issuance of revenue bonds for Electric Light and Power System Extensions and Improvements, of which number 9,218 votes were cast "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$34,200,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER SYSTEM EXTENSIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS"; and 1,463 votes were cast "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$34,200,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER SYSTEM EXTENSIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS"; and

WHEREAS, it further appears from said returns that there were cast at said election 10,651 votes on the proposition for the issuance of revenue bonds for Waterworks System Extensions and Improvements, of which number 9,253 votes were cast "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$8,100,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR WATERWORKS SYSTEM EXTENSIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS"; and 1,398 votes were cast "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$8,100,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR WATERWORKS SYSTEM EXTENSIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS"; and

WHEREAS, it further appears from said returns that there were cast at said election 10,662 votes on the proposition for the issuance of revenue bonds for Sewer System Extensions and Improvements, of which number 9,318 votes were cast "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$7,700,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR SEWER SYSTEM EXTENSIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS"; and 1,344 votes were cast "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$7,700,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR SEWER SYSTEM EXTENSIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS"; and

WHEREAS, the City Council considers that it is to the best interest of the City and its inhabitants that at the earliest possible date the City provide funds for such purposes, thereby creating an emergency measure for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety of the citizens of the City; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUSTIN:

SECTION 1: That the aforesaid election was duly and legally called and notice thereof given in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the

ordinance calling said election; that said election was held in strict conformity with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and the returns thereof have been properly made to the officials of the City entitled to receive same; that only resident qualified property taxpaying electors of the said City of Austin, Texas, who owned property therein, subject to taxation, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, were permitted to vote at said election; and, further that said election properly represents the desires of those qualified to vote as aforesaid.

SECTION 2: That the proposition to issue the \$34,200,000 revenue bonds for the purpose of extending and improving the City's Electric Light and Power System was sustained by a majority of the qualified electors of said City, voting at said election, who own taxable property in said City, and who had duly rendered the same for taxation, and that the City Council of said City is authorized to issue said bonds and to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds in the time and manner prescribed by law.

SECTION 3: That the proposition to issue the \$8,100,000 revenue bonds for the purpose of extending and improving the City's Waterworks System was sustained by a majority of the qualified electors of said City, voting at said election, who own taxable property in said City, and who had duly rendered the same for taxation, and that the City Council of said City is authorized to issue said bonds and to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds in the time and manner prescribed by law.

SECTION 4: That the proposition to issue the \$7,700,000 revenue bonds for the purpose of extending and improving the City's Sewer System was sustained by a majority of the qualified electors of said City, voting at said election, who own taxable property in said City, and who had duly rendered the same for taxation, and that the City Council of said City is authorized to issue said bonds and to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds in the time and manner prescribed by law.

SECTION 5. That the public importance of this measure and the fact that it is to the best interest of the City and its inhabitants to provide funds for the improvements hereinabove set out, at the earliest possible date for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety of the citizens of the City of Austin, Texas, constitute an emergency and an imperative public necessity that this resolution shall take effect and be in full force immediately upon its passage, all ordinance and charter rules governing the effective date of any resolution are hereby suspended and this resolution shall take effect and be in force and effect from and after its final passage, and it is so resolved.

Mayor Palmer said it was his belief by the overwhelming vote that the people wanted to move out and get the utility services prepared . He asked for a report on the timing of some of the projects.

The City Manager reported on schedules as follows:

Water Plant No. 3, Bids to be taken in May or June. Two and a half to three years will be necessary for constructing the plant, and about a year to install the big water line.

Dry Creek Sewer Project, the large sewer line to be tunnelled under Mount Bonnell is about ready for bidding.

The Electric Utility, has plans and specifications on Decker Creek Dam ready and would like to have bids opened in the Council on May 5th. It is hoped also to take bids on the water line from the river to the lake and on the small railroad spur from the T & N O southerly to the Plant site on May 5th.

On April 7th bids on the large equipment will be received for the following:

Closed Feedwater Heater  
Deaerator Feedwater Heater  
Boiler Feed Pumps

The generator and turbine and boiler condenser have been purchased.

The only large item remaining will be the plant construction which involves construction of the building, erection of the boilers, and tying everything together to make a Power Plant. Decker No. 1 is scheduled to be on the line by the spring of 1970.

Councilman LaRue called attention to the fact the entire shoreline of this new lake will be publicly owned and designed for public use, and this development will be moved along as expeditiously as the other. The City Manager reported the planning of the park area development, camping sites, launching areas, and all types of park facilities are under way. He stated the Lake would be filled in 1968 or 1969.

There being no further business Councilman LaRue moved that the Council adjourn. The motion, seconded by Councilman White, carried by the following vote:
