That each of the propositions to adopt the amendment thereunder proposed at said election, was sustained, and that at such election each and all of said amendments were approved and adopted by a majority of the qualified voters of said city voting at said election, and that each of the said charter amendments thereby became and is now hereby recognized and declared to be a part of the City Charter of the City of Austin, Texas, and it is so ordered.

Councilman Avery moved that the above resolution be adopted as read. Motion prevailed by the following vote: Ayes, Mayor Yett, Councilmen Avery, Haynes, Nolen and Searight, 5; nayes, none.

Councilman Haynes introduced the following resolution:

City of Austin, Texas, in payment of amount due and owing by the City Assessor and Collector for the School Fund's share of interest and penalties collected on taxes from January 1st to September 30th, 1921, (after reduction of refunds in final settlement of sundry tax settlements allowed by the City Council, amounting to \$83.08) and the said amount of \$1,080.25 is hereby made payable to the Treasurer of the Austin Public Schools, an itemized statement of amounts under this appropriation certified as correct by Fred Sterzing, Assessor and Collector, being made the basis of this resolution.
