

## REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL: Austin, Texas, Feb. 20, 1919.

The Council was called to order by the Mayor. Roll call showed the following present: Mayor Wooldridge, Councilmen Anthony, Bartholomew, Haynes, and Powell, 5; absent none.

The minutes of Feb. 13, 15 and 18, 1919, were read, and approved by a vote of 5 yeas, no nays.

The January reports of the Municipal Nurse and the Secretary of the United Charities were read and ordered filed.

Affidavits of A. Robinson and Mrs. Lola Crow relative to the east and north property lines of the old Hooper property at Rio Grande and Eighth Streets were read and referred to the City Attorney with instructions to prepare a resolution <sup>recognizing</sup> the lines on which a fence had stood as early as 1870, according to these affidavits.

Three numerously signed petitions for street work, as follows, were read to the Council: on West Fifth between Bowie and Crockett Streets; on West Eighth and Nelson Streets; in Glenwood Addition (street work and fire plugs).

Councilman Anthony nominated O. A. Arnold to be a special policeman without pay, with the provision that he should be allowed to carry a pistol only when on the premises of the Baum Junk Company, where he is employed. The nomination was confirmed by the following vote: Yeas, Mayor Wooldridge, Councilmen Bartholomew, Haynes, and Powell, 4; Councilman Anthony not voting.

Upon the application of H. B. Beck, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds of the University, the Council voted, by 5 yeas, no nays, to permit the burning of ten condemned airplanes in the low, vacant space near the hangar of the School of Military Aeronautics, this to be done under the supervision of the Fire Chief or some one designated by him.

The Council then adjourned.
