SUBJECT: NACTO Designing Cities 2015, transportation conference in Austin Oct. 28-31

The National Association of City Transportation Officials (NACTO) is one of country's most innovative transportation organizations, and Austin is one of 40 member NACTO cities. Mayor Steve Adler will deliver the conference kick-off talk, and he also will introduce the keynote luncheon speaker, Philadelphia Mayor Michael Nutter.

It is bringing to Austin a wealth of the best and brightest ideas from around the nation for improving a city's multimodal street network.
