SUBJECT: Austin Police Department Grants

Resolution No. 20200611-096 directs the City Manager to "...review all grants received by the Austin Police Department to determine if those funds and initiatives align with and advance Council's affirmed vision for department policies and practices." The purpose of this memorandum is to inform Council that the Austin Police Department (APD) grants offered for Council consideration on the September 3, 2020 meeting agenda meet the direction of the Resolution.

Last Friday, APD received notification from the U.S. Attorney's Office that they will not be funding the City's FY21 Project Safe Neighborhood grant application; therefore, #40 will be withdrawn from the agenda.

#40. Approve a resolution authorizing the application for and acceptance of grant funding in the amount of \$128,019 from the State of Texas, Office of the Governor, Criminal Justice Division to implement the Austin Police Department program titled Project Safe Neighborhoods.
