












FY 2017 Budget by Program


Program Highlights

- 19% increase medical social work services (to HIV/STD/TB Patients) in FY 16.
- 85% of people living with HIV had 1+ HIVrelated health visit, 79% were retained in care, and 71% were virally suppressed.
- Teen pregnancy prevention established at 3 high schools & expanded at 3 more.
- Established Health Equity prevention and education services to minority populations with negative health outcomes.
- Implemented Public Health Preparedness Plan for department wide training and exercises.


Parking Lot Expansion at Far South and Montopolis APH Sites (Completed)





Betty Dunkerley Campus Building Renovations

Project Scope: \$10.0 million

- Major renovations to four Campus buildings
- >Replacement of flooring, windows, and HVAC systems
- Installation of sound attenuation fixtures and solar energy panels
- ≻CM District 3
- **Opening Date**: Pending approvals, est. 2022







Colony Park Neighborhood Center

Project Scope: \$11.8 million

- New 15,000 sf multi-purpose neighborhood facility
- Three APH programs: Neighborhood Center, Central Immunization Clinic, and WIC Center
- >18 staff + non-profit partner agencies
- Consistent with 2014 Colony Park Master Plan
- >Joint facility with another City department (possibly PARD)
- ≻CM District 1
- **Opening Date**: Pending approvals, est. 2022



Dove Springs Neighborhood Center

Project Scope: \$15.7 million

- >New 15,000 sf multi-purpose neighborhood facility
- Three APH programs: Neighborhood Center, Central Immunization Clinic, and WIC Center
- >18 staff + non-profit partner agencies
- ≻No such City facility currently located in 78744 Southeast Austin
- ➢ Joint facility with PARD
- ≻CM District 2
- **Opening Date**: Pending approvals, est. 2022

North Central Austin Neighborhood Center



Project Scope: \$19.8 million


- >New 20,000 sf multi-purpose center in the Rundberg/Braker area
- Four APH programs: Neighborhood Center, Central Immunization Clinic, Northwest WIC Center, and Refugee Services Center
- ≻55 staff and 125+ clients per day
- > Project need based on a large number of underserved populations
- ► CM District 4 and 7
- **Opening Date**: Pending approvals, est. 2022

Main Public Health Building

Project Scope: \$63.2 million

- Multi-story Austin Public Health main building at the Betty Dunkerley Campus – part of Master Plan for campus
- >64,000 sf facility for staff currently at the RBJ Building and the Rutherford Complex
- >Multilevel parking structure for 285 staff and 150 visitors/clients
- Cost-effective investment that would consolidate isolated operations and free up valuable real estate (RBJ, Rutherford, etc.)
- ≻CM District 3
- **Opening Date**: Pending approvals, est. 2022



- Update existing aging facilities with new energy efficient features and prolong their life cycle
