## **ARRA Summary**

- American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA)
  - \$787 billion program February 17<sup>th</sup>, 2009
  - Over 200 spending programs
    - both existing and new programs
  - Funding available in various forms:
    - Formula Allocations
    - Competitive Grants
    - Directly from Federal Government
    - Pass-thru from State
  - Many different timelines, structures, and guidelines
    - Very fluid, often undefined
    - Not one single City stimulus program, various components
    - High level of transparency and accountability

- 26 Different Programs across 10 Federal Agencies have or could provide direct funding opportunities for the City of Austin
  - Infrastructure
  - Energy
  - Public Safety
  - Community Services
- City of Austin has received \$13.9 million in formula awarded ARRA funds
- City of Austin has applied for \$34.2 million in ARRA competitive grants





### <u>Infrastructure</u>

### Department of Agriculture (1 program)

- AWU has identified preserve land management projects that could access funds
- No guidelines / timelines
- Highly competitive

### Bureau of Reclamation (1 program)

- AWU has identified 3 programs that could be eligible -
  - low income efficiency leak program, direct-install toilets, sub-surface leak detection
- May 19<sup>th</sup> grant deadline





#### **Infrastructure**

Environmental Protection Agency (3 programs)

- AWU has 38 clean water and drinking water projects that may be eligible for TWDB no-interest loans or grants
  - TWDB determination will be in May & June
- Brownfields program
  - 2 prior grant applications could access funding

### Department of Transportation (4 programs)

- Aviation may receive up to \$9 million from FAA to help fund the Remain Overnight Apron project
- Awaiting CAMPO allocation of its share of State's \$2.3 billion in transportation funding
  - City submitted 6 projects in January, expect \$8-\$10 million
- \$1.5 billion Competitive grant program for transportation
- May be able access \$8 billion Rail program for infrastructure at TODs

### **Energy**


Department of Energy (6 programs) & EPA (1 program)

- City has received \$7.5 million in EECBG funds
  - allocate to City facility energy improvements
- \$400 million competitive EECGB program
  - will look to enhance existing energy efficiency programs for AE customers
  - no guidelines / timelines
- \$4.5 billion in Smart Grid
- \$5 billion in Weatherization
  - awaiting State guidelines / timelines
- \$600 million for Diesel Reduction & Alternative Fuel
  - applied for \$11.8 million EPA grant for vehicles
  - DOE Grant (infrastructure & vehicles) deadline is May 29th
    - Public forum has already occurred to discuss new infrastructure and collaborations on alternative fuels
    - Governmental & Private Entities
    - still assessing options

### **Public Safety**

Department of Justice (4 programs)

- Applied for 50 new police officers as part of COPS program
- Use \$1.4 million Byrne Justice Assistance Grants for COPS onetime costs
- Applied for \$1.6 million in Southern Border Narcotics grants
- Applied for \$7.0 million in grants for communications, violent crime, forensics
- Applied for \$0.8 million to enhance Austin Recovery Program
  - funding for additional housing allowances for clients who complete treatment, and case workers

### Department of Homeland Security (1 program)

- Fire station Women's Locker Rooms could be eligible for \$225 million program
  - no guidelines / timelines
  - highly competitive





#### **Community Services**

Department of Agriculture (1 program)

- \$500 million in WIC grants will be made available, pass thru from State
  - no guidelines / timelines

### Department of Health & Human Services (1 program)

- \$1 billion will be available for immunizations / disease prevention
  - o no guidelines / timelines

### Department of Housing & Urban Development (2 programs)

- City has received \$3.0 million for HPRP
- City has received \$2.0 million for CDBG
  - public process to program these funds is on-going
  - May 14<sup>th</sup> Council action

### National Endowment for the Arts (1 program)

City has applied for a \$250,000 grant





### Outreach & Coordination

- Public Processes already underway ...
  - Allocation of Homelessness Prevention and Rapid-Re Housing Program funds
  - Allocation of CDBG Program funds
  - Alternative Fuel opportunities
- Coordination
  - Intergovernmental Executive Stimulus Team
    - key focus on transportation coordination & aligning infrastructure/energy projects with workforce development
    - will create staff level working groups on specific areas such as energy
    - will provide reports to Joint Subcommittee
- Stakeholder Stimulus Information Meeting week of May 18th
  - Focus on social service providers / workforce development
