Community Youth Development Program



The Community Youth Development Program is funded through a Grant from the Texas Department of Family and Protective Service through the City of Austin.

CYD History

The Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (TDFPS) awarded funding to the City of Austin, to prevent juvenile delinquency through positive youth development in 78744 area. This area was one of the original 15 communities across the state which TDFPS solicited proposals for funding under the Community Youth Development (CYD) Grants Program.

The 78744 Community Youth Development Program funds an array of prevention services that support families and enhance the positive development of youth in the 78744 zip code.

Since 1996, the project has engaged more than 8000 children, youth and parents in primary delinquency prevention efforts in order to reduce and prevent juvenile crime in the area.

Today, CYD continues to have a lasting affect on the 78744 community. CYD is proud to have a 100% rate of youth who are involved in a CYD not engaging in delinquent behavior while attending a program and a 96% satisfaction rate from the youth!

- ♦ To reduce and **prevent juvenile delinquency** in 78744
- ♦ To increase **youth leadership** and community development
- ♦ To increase the use and availability of role models, **positive examples**, mentors and tutors of youth
- ♦ To provide **life skills** enhancing programs for youth

Creative Action Programs:

Crossing the Line

Creative Action's actor-teachers help middle school students devise solutions to the everyday problems they face. Students learn concrete conflict resolution skills, focusing on articulating their feelings, controlling anger, and identifying personal goals. Sessions are held during the school day at various times during the school year. (Offered only at Ojeda and Mendez Middle Schools.)

Courage to Stand/Courage in Action

Students learn to approach the challenge of bullying through interactive performance. By exploring acts of courage throughout history,

students learn to examine the choices, risks, and consequences of intervention to help the target in bullying situations. This program is available for 4th and 5th grade students and sessions are held during the school day at various times during the school year.

Creative Action Summer Program

We place train "Artists-in-Residence" at sites in the 78744 community to implement an arts-based curriculum that is designed to prepare students to be active, creative and positive members of their community. Activities include theatre, visual arts, puppet and mask making, dance, drumming, team building, creative writing, music, filmmaking and much, much more. This program is available for 4th-12th grade and is offered during the summer.

Workers Assistance and Youth Advocacy Programs:

These programs are provided by the Workers Assistance program and Youth Advocacy. They are offered at various elementary and middle schools (4th-8th grade) in 78744 for youth that reside and/or attend school in 78744.

Group Mentoring

Youth Advocacy provides an after-school group mentoring program that focuses on building relationships between young people and caring adults who serve as role models and life coaches. Mentors help the youth develop character, learn and develop leadership and communication skills, build self-esteem, and understanding of positive ways to resolve conflicts.

Youth Leadership Development

YLD Program is an eleven-session youth leadership program that provides participants with the

opportunity to develop strong and effective leadership skills by using skill building activities to promote self-esteem, empowerment, conflict resolution, communication skills, goal settings and academic skills.

Strengthening Families Program

This program is a seven-session family skills program that provides assistance for youth and their parents/caregivers. The program gives participants the opportunity to increase their self-awareness while improving family relationships and the social and life skills of the youth participants. The goal of the program is the increased personal growth of the participants.

Youth Advisory Committee

The YAC program is provided by the City of Austin Health and Human Services Department. It is offered at the Dove Springs Recreation Center to youth from the 78744 area that are between the ages of 11-17.
