



Metropolitan Austin continues to surge

In terms of percent change year over year, the Austin—Round Rock MSA continues to be the **nation's fastest** growing large metropolitan area.

City's share of regional growth reaches an all-time low

The bigger story is the fact that Austin's **share of total metropolitan population growth** has slipped significantly, now sitting at just over 30%.








Sustainably Manage our Water Resources

Biggest accomplishments of the past 5 years

- Strong gains in water conservation
- Response to challenges of the recent historic drought and flooding
- Onion & Williamson Creek flood property buyouts
- Adoption of the Watershed Protection Ordinance
- Update of the Watershed Protection Master Plan





Challenges faced over the past 5 years

 Changing climate, major flooding, drought, and population growth require ongoing adaptation and increased planning and collaboration

Lessons learned over the past 5 years

- Value of increased communication and coordination between departments
- Regulations help prevent/mitigate impacts associated with urbanization and reduce public and private expenses





Looking ahead

Water Forward – Austin's 100-Year Integrated Water Resource Plan

- Plan will include recommendations for meeting Austin's future water needs
- Plan development is being led by Austin Water and supported by a Council-appointed Water Forward Task Force
 - Includes department representatives from Watershed Protection, Austin Energy, Office of Sustainability and others
- Projected to be complete in mid-2018

Environmental integrity index of stream water quality



- Rapid population growth protection of natural systems and GI in new development
- Re-integration of GI into the built urban environment
- Funding for programs and projects

Lessons learned over the past 5 years

- Continued strong public support protection of natural resources and investment in GI
- Integration of green with grey infrastructure is often most cost-effective
- Interdepartmental collaboration is essential







Looking ahead

CodeNEXT

- Build upon existing environmental regulations
- Recommended policies that:
 - Preserve and restore the natural environment
 - Promote additional GI
 - Further integrate nature into the city

Integrated GI Plan

- Council resolution → Inventory and assess existing green infrastructure assets, plans, policies, and programs to identify gaps and recommend solutions to close gaps
- Plan development work plan in March 2018
- Continue to focus on improved management of City-owned GI assets







Challenges


- Increasing land, materials and labor costs = increasing housing costs
- No additional funding for affordable housing
- City's limited ability to influence housing prices
- Legislative constraints
- Suburbanization of poverty





Looking ahead

- Per Council direction, collaborate on CodeNEXT to:
 - Provide affordable housing options, esp. in high opportunity areas
 - Affirmatively further fair housing
- Implement Strategic Housing Blueprint
 - Goal for 75% of new housing to be within ½ mile of Imagine Austin Centers & Corridors


