What is a neighborhood park?

- Backbone of Austin's park system
- Respond to demographic and cultural characteristics of neighborhoods
- Provide basic recreational opportunities close to home
- Ideally, all citizens have easy access to a neighborhood park within one-mile of their residences

- 2-30 acres in size
- Traditional recreation opportunities such as playgrounds, basketball and tennis courts, open play areas, and picnic tables
- Less traditional recreation opportunities such as wildflowers, native plants, less intensive maintenance techniques

• Does not typically include: splash pads and pools

- March 7, 2023 Community Meeting #1 Input on Park Amenities, open online survey
- -• May 2023 Community Meeting #2 On-site meeting for preliminary layout options for public comment / input on phasing and layout, open online survey
- July 2023 Community Meeting #3 Final draft plan for comment
- Early Fall COA PARD for official review and adoption








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

Where do you live in relation to the park?


65% of respondents live within three blocks of Grand Meadow Park.






Does your household have children? If so, how old?

Over 50% of respondents have children in their household.




Please describe where you currently live?

30% of respondents drive to the park, the remaining 70% walk, bike, or take public transit.






Which value is most important to you for the future park?


Safety, access to nature, and access to recreational activities were all top priorities.

Responses were split fairly evenly between a place to bring children or dogs, a place to exercise, connect with nature, and gather with family & community.




Which park elements would you most like to see included in the park?

LAYOUT PLAN #1

This layout is intentionally informal and low-maintenance, showcasing the park's existing natural resources by preserving large swaths of wildflowers. A 1/3 mile decomposed granite loop trail invites visitors to meander through the wildflower meadows while discovering strategically placed pockets of exercise equipment, picnic areas, community art installations, and educational signage.

The park's central feature is a large picnic pavilion, serving as a community hub that connects the community garden, food forest, and nature play area, bringing people of all ages together. Additionally, the park features a partially-fenced, informal play lawn designed to provide children with a safe and stimulating environment that fosters exploration and creativity.



LAYOUT PLAN #2

This layout maximizes Grand Meadow Park's nearly 10-acres to create a lively hub for recreational activity. A 1/2 mile loop encircles the park by connecting the existing sidewalks along Thaxton Rd, Panadero Dr., and Alum Rock Dr..

A central path within the park connects various zones of activity. One side of the park clusters the food forest and community garden, along with a small parking lot and pavilion. Another area groups a traditional playground, basketball and pickleball courts, exercise equipment, picnic pavilion, and a large play field. A fenced dog park is set apart from the other activities to give furry friends a safe place to play. The park is also fenced around the perimeter to protect visitors from nearby traffic.

Existing wildflower meadows are strategically preserved throughout the park, providing a beautiful natural backdrop for all activities while also serving as a buffer between the park and nearby roads.


