

Living In a WUI

Food For Wildlife

During the winter months food can become more scarce for wildlife. This month's Living in a Wildland Urban Interface article focuses on providing food for wildlife in creative ways. Bird feeders can be made with a variety of materials that

your home. Have some leftover pumpkins or citrus fruits that you got for the holidays?
Why not turn them into edible bird feed dispensers?
Fruits such as oranges, grapefruits, melons, and even



pumpkins can be scooped out and used as hanging bowls for suet feed or bird seed.

It's a nice way to use that pumpkin or orange that's looking a little old. Edible garland using popcorn, nuts and berries can also be used to decorate backyard trees, provide food for wildlife, and help you to rid your pantries of old snacks and trail mixes.

Old rum, wine, beer, and sports drinks can also be added to fruit feeders to attract butterflies.

Living In a WUI



Suggested Materials:

- -1 grapefruit or orange
- -2 pounds of suet
- -1 bag of birdseed
- -string or ribbon

Cut the fruit in half and scoop out the inside s. Poke holes in the sides of the fruit for the strings. Stuff suet into the fruit and sprinkle birdseed over the suet. Place fruit in the freezer to let suet harden then hang in your yard!

Suggested Materials:

- -1 roll of twine
- -sewing needles
- -2 bags of popped popcorn
- -3 bags of raw peanuts (in shells)
- -apple chunks
- -grapes
- -cranberries


