Firestation #20 Wildlife Habitat Project

Wildlife Austin works with a variety of groups on habitat projects including schools, businesses, places of worship and other city departments including the Fire Department. The latest undertaking was to transform the landscape at fire station #20 in south Austin into a more wildlife friendly and sustainable space.

Firefighter Steve Hope contacted Wildlife Austin with the vision to remove grass and replant the area with native plants to provide habitat for butterflies and birds and also save on water, time and money. Program staff offered technical assistance and volunteer support for this exciting project. A three person team of Habitat Steward Volunteers worked with city staff to create the design, plan the pre-work days and install the plants on the final work day held on October 24th. Approximately 18 volunteers including PARD trained Habitat Stewards, Master Naturalists and friends and family of the firefighters were involved in a variety of activities ranging from plant donation and fostering, grass removal and trail building to full garden installation. The Habitat Team also solicited and received a \$250 donation from the Natural Gardener Nursery which was a boost to the project budget and generated great enthusiasm from the team.

The project planning and installation of phase one of the habitat garden was very successful. This success could not have been achieved without all the dedicated people involved in this project. A special thanks to the B shift at fire station #20 and especially to Steve Hope who initiated this project and also to the Habitat Stewards volunteer team of Joan Rivers, Mary Martin, and Simonetta Rodriquez. The habitat demonstration garden is located on the grounds of fire station #20 at 6601 Manchaca Road.
