REPEAT OFFENDER PROGRAM

Officers from the Multi-Family and Commercial Inspection Teams assessed over 80 vacant and occupied units as well as the entire exterior of the 42 buildings on the property.

On March 30 and 31st, the Austin Code Department conducted two Repeat Offender Periodic Annual Inspections. The first inspection took place at Solaris located at 1601 Royal Crest Drive.

Solaris, which was the first multi-family property placed in the Repeat Offender Program on April 1, 2014, has a history of structural issues, dangerous conditions, and crime dating back to No-



ranging from drug-related activity to prostitution. Following the Austin Code inspection, the code officers will assess and report any violations, and determine whether or not the complex will be removed from the program. If the property fails the periodic inspection, it will remain in the program for a minimum of two years.

Coppertree located at 2425 Cromwell Circle followed the Solaris inspection. Code officers assessed about 40 vacant units and the entire exterior of this location as well. The main issues on this property are foundation problems and the complex catwalks. If the property passes the

inspection, they will be removed from the Repeat Offender Program. All rental properties that have been cited with numerous health and safety violations within 24 consecutive months are required to register with the City of Austin Repeat Offender Program by City Council resolution (Ordinance No. 20130926-012). This ordinance requires inspections and other guidelines for rental properties that meet the criteria for repeat offenders.
